DX in the absence of DX Extras

ARLD031 Swain's Island, KH8, added to ARRL DXCC List

With the addition of Section II, Criteria Rule 1c) to the Political Entity criteria, certain former separation entities may now qualify as Political Entities. One such entity has been determined to be American Samoa. American Samoa is now a Political Entity for DXCC purposes.

As a result of the reclassification of American Samoa, and upon the filing of a request and substantiating evidence, and with the concurrence of the DXAC and the Awards Committee, Swain's Island has been added to the DXCC List.

Swain's Island, entity number 337, qualifies as the first separation entity from American Samoa, now a Political Entity. The distance between American Samoa and Swain's Island has been determined to be in excess of 350 km as required by DXCC Rules Section II, Paragraph 2, Section b). QSOs made with Swain's Island on or after 0001z, July 22, 2006 will count for DXCC credit. The prefix is KH8. ==>MONTENEGRO INTERNATIONAL DX FESTIVAL UNDER WAY

Radio amateurs and equipment from all over Europe and from a few countries outside the continent converged this week on Montenegro -- the newest DXCC entity -- for the Montenegro International DX Festival. The event kicked off at noon on Thursday, July 20, with a salute to Montenegrin hams, the Amateur Radio Association of Montenegro and the country's telecoms authority and military. The three-week Amateur Radio event is aimed at putting the tiny, new Balkan nation on the DX map in a big way. Seven stations identifying as 403T will be on the air from various locations. Nineteen-year old Nikola Ilic, YZ6AMD, made the first 403T QSO to start the festival, working DF3IU.

8<...Nearly four dozen operators from more than 10 countries are expected to serve as 4O3T operators during the DX Festival, which continues until August 13. ARRL CEO David Sumner K1ZZ and his wife Linda KA1ZD will join the event in progress.

Look for 4O3NT on or about these frequencies: CW: 1826.5, 3522, 7022, 10,106, 14,022, 18,072, 21,022, 24,892 and 28,022 kHz; SSB: 3795, 7055, 14,190, 18,145, 21,290, 24,945 and 28,490 kHz; RTTY: 7035, 10,135, 14,085, 18,105, 21,085 and 28,085 kHz; 6 meters, CW/SSB: 50,106 kHz. Re: malicious interference from Repeaters column in April 1986 Q-Fiver

... I think it's also worth reviewing Oh-Ky-In's policy on malicious interference on the repeaters. It's a simple one: IGNORE! (*This applies especially to recent interference on Tech Talk – Ye Ed*) Persons who misuse their licences in this manner are looking for attention, and every comment or acknowledgement of their presence encourages them to do it again (sorta like turning in a false alarm to see the pretty red fire trucks). Remember, there's usually a control operator on frequency who will keep the jammer from doing anything which might be even more illegal. Stand by, QSY, or help track him down; but never, NEVER discuss him on the repeater! By the way, don't try to cover him up, either. For the third year in a row, a young woman has been named to receive the 2006 *Amateur Radio Newsline*[™] Young Ham of the Year Award (YHOTY) *<http://www.yhoty.org/>*. She's Cathy Ferry NC8F -- an 18-year-old from Silver Lake, Ohio.

"Cathy was selected based on her long-term commitment to Amateur Radio, her work in public service and in promoting the hobby/service to others," the Newsline announcement said.

The daughter of Bruce Ferry AK8B and the late Joan Ferry, Cathy was first licensed at age 10 and received her Extra class license at 13. Currently an ARES Assistant Emergency Coordinator, she has been involved in numerous public service events since age 12. For the past two years she's served as a net

control station for the Roadrunner Akron Marathon. An ARRL member, Cathy is secretary of the Summit County Red Cross Amateur Radio Club.

For the past two years been the editor of the Cuyahoga Falls Amateur Radio Club newsletter. In 2004 the publication received an honorable mention in the ARRL Ohio Section Newsletter Contest. (*Hurrah! – Ye Ed*) She has also overseen ticket sales for her club's annual hamfest. Additionally, she assists in teaching the club's Technician class licensing course. Cathy has promoted Amateur Radio at Cuyahoga Falls High School while maintaining a 3.5 grade point average.

In addition to her interest in Amateur Radio, Cathy is an accomplished musician who plays bassoon. She currently is with the Cleveland Youth Wind Symphony, which recently performed a series of concerts in Australia. This fall, Cathy is planning to major in music at Baldwin-Wallace College in Berea, Ohio. 4 named to task force set to craft an Ohio PRB-1

A Task Force of four Ohio Ham Radio Operators has been named to craft proposed legislation -- an Ohio PRB-1 -- to be introduced to a new Ohio General Assembly.

Named to head the task force is Ohio State Government Liaison (SGL) Nick Pittner WB8TMF of West Jefferson. Nick is a partner in the law firm of Bricker and Eckler of Columbus and he specializes in working on state legislation. In 2000, the Cleveland *Plain Dealer*, Ohio's major daily newspaper, named Nick its "Ohioan of the Year" for his work in public school legislation. Also named to the Task Force are;

(1) Assistant Section Manager, Robert Winston W2THU of Cleveland -- an attorney in private practice who specializes in ham radio tower protection legislation;

(2) ARRL Volunteer Counsel Thomas Lee K8AZ of Chesterland, a partner in the law firm of Taft, Stettinius and Hollister who specializes in municipal government law:

(3) Section Manager Joe Phillips K8QOE, who is assigned to perform any administrative tasks the other three members may require.

==>CANADIAN TEAM TAKES WRTC-2006 GOLD, "PHANTOM QSOs" MYSTERY CLOUDS EVENT

Canadians John Sluymer VE3EJ and Jim Roberts VE7ZO (ex-VE3IY) officially topped the 46-team field at World Radiosport Team Championship 2006 (WRTC-2006) in Brazil http://www.wrtc2006.org July 8-9. As PT5M they logged nearly 2.44 million points to take home the gold. US teams took the second and third positions for silver and bronze medals, respectively. But the appearance in one log of a large number of what officials are calling "phantom QSOs" took another team out of medal contention. Earning the silver medal was the US-West team of Californians Dan Craig N6MJ and Dave Mueller N2NL with nearly 2.32 million points from PW5C. The national special invited team of Doug Grant K1DG and Andy Blank N2NT -- operating as PT5Y -- landed in third place with almost 2.1 million points. They had been in fourth place in the preliminary "Scoreboard" results as the event ended at July 9 at 1200 UTC. The final five changed, however, once WRTC-2006 officials reviewed all logs. *The Q-Fiver, Oh-Ky-In ARS, August 2006 page 12*

Preliminary Scoreboard numbers had the Serbia-Montenegro team of Ranko Boca YT6A and Djurica Maletin YT6T -- operating as PT5L -- scrambling from 11th to third place in the final hour of the event. When the smoke cleared, however, they ended in 11th place.

In a statement <http://www.wrtc2006.com/release59.html> July 14, WRTC-2006 officials explained that the PT5L log contained an unusually high number of "uniques" -- call signs that appeared rarely or not at all in the logs of more than 1000 IARU contest participants or of other WRTC-2006 competitors. The officials said recorded audio from PT5L confirmed that the QSOs had in fact taken place.

"It appeared to the judges, from listening to the recording while examining annotated log extracts identifying the 'uniques,' that there was a small number of stations, probably more than one, feeding 'phantom QSOs' to PT5L," the WRTC-2006 statement said. Signing the statement in addition to Atilano de Oms PY5EG, as WRTC-2006 steering committee chair, were judges David Sumner K1ZZ and Roger Western G3SXW and Log-Checking Committee members Larry "Tree" Tyree N6TR and Phil Goetz N6ZZ. As a result, the judges and log-checking committee decided to reduce the threshold for determining a unique QSO to a relatively small number of logs and to delete all uniques from the logs of all 46 competing teams.

While most teams lost about 15 QSOs, the action resulted in the deletion of 240 contacts -- nearly all "manufactured" at the other end -- from the PT5L log and the loss of the bronze medal. The five WRTC-2006 officials said it appears most likely that the "phantom QSOs" were intended to sabotage either one or both of the PT5L operators specifically or a randomly selected WRTC station.

"Such behavior, by amateur operators outside the WRTC event itself, is both reprehensible and illegal and deserves to be thoroughly investigated," the officials said. "However, doing so within the time frame of the WRTC event was impossible."

Taking the fourth spot with some 2.02 million points was the Ukrainian team of Yuri Onipko UT4UZ and Dimitry Stashuk UT5UGR, who competed as PW5X. They'd showed up in fifth place in the preliminary standings. Rounding out the top five was the PT5D team of Stefano Brioschi IK2QEI and Stefano Galli IK2JUB of Italy. They racked up nearly 1.99 million points.

These special awards were also presented: PW5U (XE1KK/XE1NTT) for the most CW QSO points among stations with at least 35 percent SSB QSOs; PT5N (9A8A/9A5K) for the most SSB QSO points; PW5K (ES5TV/ES2RR) for the most accurate log among the top 20 finisher, and PW5G (IZ3EYZ/9A1UN) for the top score among Bi-National Young Team participants.

WRTC-2006 selected 47 teams to take part, but only 46 competed because the Czech Republic team of OK1FUA and OK2RZ was unable to get to Brazil because of an airline service suspension. Citing other commitments, three-time WRTC winners Dan Street K1TO and Jeff Steinman N5TJ did not participate in this year's event in Brazil. -- *The ARRL Letter*, Vol 25 #28, July 14, 2006 page 13

==>"MAGIC BAND" DOES ITS THING

Stations in several parts of the US took advantage of a monster opening on 6 meters -- the "Magic Band" --Wednesday, July 12. *The Daily DX* <http://www.dailydx.com> Editor Bernie McClenny W3UR, who also edits "How's DX?" for *QST*, says the band began warming up at his Maryland QTH before sunrise, but the biggest opening occurred just before 2100 UTC.

"The band stayed open to Europe until just after 0000Z today," McClenny said July 13. He credits fellow 6-meter DX chaser Marty Green K2PLF with tipping him off. "I ran downstairs and could not believe my ears," McClenny enthused in the July 13 edition of *The Daily DX*. "I have never heard conditions so good and so widespread into Europe."

McClenny said "the band was packed" from about 50.066 to well above 50.200 MHz with CW and SSB signals and even a few weak digital signals. So bountiful were the 6-meter DX spots, he recounts, "I didn't know where to begin." McClenny said conditions were so good "stations with 10-foot high antennas and 5 W were making it across the pond." *The Q-Fiver, Oh-Ky-In ARS, August 2006 page 13*

QST's "World Above 50 MHz" Editor Gene Zimmerman W3ZZ called it "probably the best 6 meter Es [sporadic E] opening of all time" into Europe. "I worked about two dozen Europeans as far east as Bulgaria but no new countries," Zimmerman said.

8<.....Rick Tharrington KD4JRX in North Carolina was among those posting exclamatory reports to the SixClub reflector. "I could not believe the European stations on the band," he said. "It sounded like 20 meters for a while!" He worked EH8BPX and ON4IQ, among others, with 59 reports. "The magic band is working its magic today!" he added. 8<In another SixClub posting, Jack Shutt W9GT said the band "was hopping" at his QTH in Indiana the evening of July 12, but he couldn't hear any DX. "Six meters, however, was open coast to coast," he reported, noting that he worked several stations to his west, including a couple in Nevada and one in California.

"I hope we can enjoy these conditions for a while yet," Shutt said. "Sure is fun when 6 is open!"

McClenny said Jose DaSilva N4IS in Southern Florida may have been the first US station to work Monte-negro on 6 meters when he snagged YU6DZ at 1559 UTC. "After four seasons on the band," McClenny concluded, "I would have to say that overall this has been the best -- and we are just about at the bottom of the sunspot cycle!
