Minutes of members' meeting, Tuesday, September 5, 2006 at Salem Presbyterian Church

Brian K4BRI called meeting to order at 7:36 PM with Pledge of Allegiance and self-introductions. There were no guests, but one ready for classes to start. 23 members were present. There was also no health and welfare news, but Bob WA6EZV and Dick WB4SUV had something for the Brag Session: they will go to Promorsko, Bulgaria for the 13th ARDF International Competition.

Dale KC8HQS then introduced the evening's speaker, Tim Pappas, an officer with Cincinnati Police Dept who has been a police officer for 17 years – 10 of them with CPD. He was a sheriff's deputy for the other 7. He said he likes his job and is fond of his dog Laser. Laser will bite, and is a "real dog." Officer Pappas said in CPD there are 10 real drug dogs, 2 wannabes and 3 real-wannabe dogs who sniff for bombs. Laser qualifies as the most dangerous dog in the K-9 unit; when he and Officer Pappas were called out for a strong-arm robbery, Laser was on a 30-ft lead.

Officer Pappas said he still hasn't figured out why those calling for help wait so late. More is found at night than during the day.

Laser, who is a brindle German shepherd, is trained for tracking, building search and article apprehension ... with or without gunfire. He was 6 years old on August 19. Training includes giving directions in German.

There is a better chance to find a fugitive at night, often within 200 yards of the occurrence. (Dale KC8HQS threatened to raffle chances to be behind the closed door during the simulated building search, inside later after the outdoor demonstrations.) Officer Pappas said he's from the east side and often gets lost in District 3, which is on the west side. If there is an alarm activation, the hunt involves a dog, who can usually tell if someone is there within 25-30 seconds. Tracking dogs are usually smaller and shorter. Suburbs usually have dual- or triple- purpose dogs, and come to CPD for training.

Animal Planet some time ago had a program on the police dog championships. The dog who wouldn't let go was Laser, who won the championship competition. He is a federally-registered service dog. Police dogs are usually German shepherds or hybrids, sometimes Dobermans or Rottweilers. Officer Pappas said he once encountered a Belgian Malawa police dog who acted as if he was on steroids, was skittish and hit with his entire body. When dogs slow down they're retired. Up to 70% of police dogs die of cancer. Program concluded at 9:05 PM.

After a very short break in which Brian K4BRI thanked Dale KC8HQS for rounding up the evening's speaker, handling hospitality and selling split-the-pot tickets, business meeting convened at 9:08 PM. Susie N8CGM requested additions or corrections to the minutes, or a motion to approve as printed. Bob WB8JHT so moved, John W9JRB second, motion carried.

121 members are reported by Nathan KA3MTT by e-mail (he was not present).

Bruce N8BV had, happily, no Silent Keys to report.

Brian K4BRI reported that the .625 climb will take place in the next month; there are logistics to consider. He has been spending a lot of time at .67. The north remote is presently on his bench. It is feared the .67 problem may be in either the hardline or the antenna. Brian suggests use of the small antenna on the building to receive and the big antenna on the tower to transmit for the time being. A fundraising effort will be required to replace that hardline and antenna -- .67 will be on stopgap measures for the time being, more later. The .925 recordings are all done. There is no Technical Committee meeting scheduled yet for this month; more activity is expected near month's end. Bob WA6EZV was going to reinstall EchoLink yesterday but was short on feedline.

Ev KC8JR reported that classes will begin Sept 21. Great instructors are rounded up for all classes, now we need students and upgrade candidates. This run will be 8 weeks, not 10.

There was no fox hunt last month, so no report.

Eric N8YC reported that the DXpedition is going! They will operate Sept 25-29 from Deer Island ME. They leave Friday Sept 22 and return Saturday Sept 30. He requested those who were going and present to stand up: Gerry KD8ASL, Pete KC8BZM, Bob WB8JHT, Phil KG8AP, Lynn WD8JAW. Dennis KB8ROA is also going. Lynn WD8JAW put Deer Island on the air for K8SCH in 2001. Pile-ups are expected this time. They will be operating on 14.260 in the IOTA frequencies, reported Brian K4BRI. Other contact should be possible through the CT Mobileers net on 14.257 at 9 AM daily. 40m should be better than 20. They expect to release a schedule.

For her dedicated work in representing the ARRL in Southeast Ohio and net manager of the OSSBN, Connie Hamilton N8IO, of Marietta, was named the 13th member of the Allen Severson AB8P (SK) Memorial Award.

The announcement was made during the 2006 Ohio Section Conference (September 16) by Ohio Section Manager, Joe Phillips K8QOE.

The late Mr. Severson, who became a silent key in 1997, was a distinguished member of the ARRL Board of Directors and former Ohio SM. The sentence -- "His dedication to serve amateur radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio Section Leadership," -- is on every Severson memorial certificate.

"In every thing she does for Ohio hams, Connie exemplifies the spirit of the late Mr. Severson," Phillips said in announcing the award.

Beside running the Ohio Single Side Band Net (OSSBN), Connie is Assistant Section Manager for Southeast Ohio. In her many appearances at SE Ohio clubs, she is often the first ARRL official to speak at that club in decades. Connie is a longtime Buckeye Belles member as well. Connie was licensed WD8MIO in 1977 and joined the OSSBN to take up traffic handling the very next year. In the early 80s, she served as manager of the 8th call area Region Cycle 2 and received the OSSBN Merit Award in 1982. In 2000, she upgraded to Extra class and changed her call to N8IO. She is currently serving the latest of many terms as OSSBN Net Manager. This is an elected position. Connie is well known throughout Ohio as the "hug lady" as she expects a hug from every one as one would expect a handshake. At the Section Conference on accepting the honor, Connie lead the entire conference in an impromptu version of "Let me call you sweetheart." *The O-Fiver, Oh-Ky-In ARS, September 2006 page 6*



The award was established in 1992 as Ohio Ham of the Year and was renamed in 1999 to honor Mr. Severson.

Earlier in the day, the annual Section Newsletter awards were announced by PIO Scott Yonally N8SY. Taking first this year was *The Buckeye Burr*, a bi-monthly edited for the Buckeye Belles by Susie Scott N8CGM. As it happens, *The Q-Fiver* won first place in 1994.

OHIO MEMBER HONORED BY GLETN

Wayne Staats WS8RM of Cuyahoga Falls, OH was honored by the Great Lakes Emergency and Traffic Net with its Gold Key Award at the September 10 Findlay Hamfest. Wayne received the recognition for his dedication and work with the Net. This included all aspects of Net operation, coordinating postings on the Net web site, serving as NCS and developing the GLETN history. Nice honor for a great job, Wayne. The GLETN serves the Canadian provinces and US states that border the Great Lakes. It meets at 8:30 PM Eastern Time nightly on 3.932 MHz.

BPL -- WHAT NEXT?

The FCC has issued its ruling on BPL. Essentially, this ruling says licensed operators (*e.g.*, Amateur Radio, law enforcement, fire services) do not automatically deserve protection from interference caused by excessive radiation of Part 15 devices. The ruling also says that mobile ham stations deserve no protection from this interference.

Think about the total implications of this ruling. It basically means the Commission can thumb its collective nose at Amateur Radio . . . or public safety radio . . . over BPL whenever it wishes. It basically means that the Commission thinks there may be more value in essentially uncontrolled BPL operations than in the operation of services in which FCC demands a license to operate! Wow!

The reason I'm pointing this out is that some of you have questioned the ARRL Board's reasoning for continuing to fight against the FCC's overt and continuing efforts to promote BPL. Any questions, now? Although my fellow Directors and I agree that BPL is not likely to become a strong force in the marketplace, its market potential is not the principal issue. The principal issue is that the Commission has overstepped its legitimate authority and is setting the stage to shaft Amateur Radio -- and police and safety and other licensed users of the spectrum -- whenever the majority of the Commissioners feel inclined to do this.

Having said the above, the Board is considering the options that remain available to us to continue the fight against illegitimate regulatory action by the FCC. I don't know exactly what form this action will take, but there are a few pathways open to us. Stay tuned!

Do you have an opinion as to what the Board should do next? Let me know.

"Those wishing to select the ARRL as to receive all or part of their payroll deductions should designate organization 9872 when completing their CFC donor forms. Donations to ARRL can be designated for Diamond Club contributions, the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund or the ARRL Education & Technology Program. Or, donors may make unrestricted contributions to the League. One important note: Since the CFC does not provide the ARRL with the names of individual donors, the ARRL Development Office would appreciate a copy of the donor form to ensure that each contribution is applied according to the donor's wishes and the contribution or pledge can be properly acknowledged. I'm through talking about the ARRL Legislative Action Program as a concept for the future. As of September 13, I can talk about it as a going operation throughout the US. On this date, ARRL President Joel Harrison W5ZN distributed documents needed by the Directors to activate the Program in their divisions and established guidelines for making key appointments in the Program.

As part of kicking this Program into high gear in the Great Lakes Division, I am pleased to announce that Val Rose N8EXV of Flint, MI has accepted appointment as the Division Legislative Action Chair. Val reports to me. His task is to manage the Program in this Division. One of his first jobs will be to find a replacement for himself as the Michigan Legislative Action Coordinator (LAC) and to search for a new LAC for Kentucky. Gregory L. Baize, Sr. KG4VJC, of Beaver Dam, Kentucky recently resigned from this position. Jim Ashman W8ASH of Arcanum, OH is the LAC for Ohio. Jim is on medical leave at the moment.

What does this mean for the average ARRL member? A lot, I hope. As stated in the Frequently Asked Questions document about the Program, "The ARRL Legislative Action Program is designed to make it possible for ARRL members to promote and protect Amateur Radio through coordinated, legitimate political action at the Federal government level." What we need at this time are members who are interested in learning how they as typical hams can become key players in "promoting and protecting" our favorite service. The talents needed to do this are the ability to talk to someone else, to dress appropriately for a business meeting (*e.g.*, shirt and tie; nice dress), the ability to look over simple information sheets and learn what should be said to a US Congressman or aide in his/her office back home when asked to do this and the desire to protect and further Amateur Radio.

Are you a sponsor of a hamfest or swap or convention? Have you applied to have this hamfest, swap or convention approved by the Director as an ARRL-sanctioned activity? You know, it's nice to do this because you get rather expensive books and other items free from ARRL. These make reasonably nice prizes for you to award.

The next question is, "When was the last time you read the 'ARRL Hamfest/Convention Rules and Regulations' to see what your end of the bargain is?" You may not realize it, but as a sponsor of the event, *The Q-Fiver, Oh-Ky-In ARS, September 2006 page 10*

you have an end to hold up. You can go to *http://www.arrl.org/FandES/field/hamfests/rules.html* to read the complete rules for being sanctioned. Some of these rules are satisfied merely through your application to me to approve sanctioning it. Others are not. The rules are not extensive, but one that I often see ignored (probably not even recognized as being a rule) relates to your end of publicizing the League in return for the value it has given your event.

Here is part of what the Rules and Regulations say about what you agree to do: "Every such [hamfest, convention etc. approved by the Director as an ARRL sanctioned event] will make provisions for an ARRL forum or meeting and for an ARRL display booth or table and shall make every effort to use the ARRL diamond prominently displayed on the front of all advertising and program materials." If there are true problems with you doing any of this, we can work something out, but ignoring the rules should not be taken lightly or as automatic.

The question I suggest that each sponsor ask him or her self is, "Are we fulfilling the requirements?" If not, my second request is that you figure out a way that is consistent both with your responsibility to achieving the success of your event and with fulfilling your obligation to ARRL. Some clubs are very meticulous in having and in providing staff for an ARRL table. Other groups are not. Some clubs are very meticulous in how they prominently display the literature ARRL HQ has sent for this table and the table, itself. Other clubs are not. In fact, the ARRL table at some events takes on the appearance of being a handy dumping station for junk (not even "junque"). Some clubs are very meticulous in announcing that prizes they receive from ARRL have been donated by ARRL. Others are as close-mouthed about the identity of ARRL as the donor as to make one think the information is a cardinal tenet of a secret society.

OK, this is all for now. GL to you all and tnx for supporting ARRL. On the other hand, as I've often said, if it wasn't for ARRL, there would be no Amateur Radio . . . which would mean there would be no radio amateurs, either.



ARLB017 (9-19-06) Radio jammer Jack Gerritsen gets seven years, fines

It was a day a lot of radio amateurs in Southern California had been anticipating for a long time. On September 18, US District Court Judge R. Gary Klausner sentenced convicted radio jammer Jack Gerritsen, now 70, (ex-KG6IRO) to seven years imprisonment and imposed \$15,225 in fines on six counts -- one a felony -- that included transmitting without a license and willful and malicious interference with radio transmissions. Before sentencing, Gerritsen apologized to the federal government, the FCC and the local Amateur Radio community, which had endured the brunt of Gerritsen's on-air tirades and outright jamming. "I'm sorry, and I apologize to everyone here," Gerritsen told those in the courtroom. Gerritsen's contrition did nothing to convince Klausner toward leniency. The judge berated Gerritsen as a repeat offender and said he believed Gerritsen would continue to commit similar offenses. The sentence even exceeded US District Attorney Lamar Baker's recommended 46 months incarceration. snip ...>8
