It all happened at the Ohio Section Conference Saturday September 15 at the Ohio Fire Academy in Reynoldsburg.


Terry Russ N8ATZ, of Massillon, called it a great conference adding that "Section Conference is a good balance of section news, general updates and technical presentations."

Bill, who is well known in ham radio's DX community, is former award winning Emergency Coordinator of Franklin County (Columbus). It was his work as EC of Central Ohio ARES that was recognized. His Severson certificate read, "For his ground breaking role in organizing emergency communications in Central Ohio and establishing a model for a county EC position."

Bill, originally from Coshocton, was first licensed in 1962 and served as EC of COARES for eight

He is currently Assistant Section Manager for central Ohio. Bill holds the #1 DXCC badge which means he has worked all the current DX list of countries. His total is 360 countries which includes the deletes.

The Severson award, granted from time to time to the Ohio ham of the year, is named for the late Allan Severson AB8P (SK) of Lakewood. The award honors the work of Allen with a single sentence which is on every award certificate - 'Allan's devotion to serve Amateur Radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio leadership."

Retirement Living TV is trying to lure America's most trusted man, Walter Cronkite KB2GSB, back to television. This, as RLTV prepares to become a 24-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week network, and the 89-year-old news icon might be perfect for the fast-growing 55+ demographic that Retirement Living TV serves. Retirement Living TV President Brad Knight has confirmed that his Columbia MD based network is in talks with Cronkite. One scenario would have the former CBS news anchor presenting a weekly commentary about anything he wants to share.

And if KB2GSB came to RLTV it would make it a kind of a family affair. This is because his son Chip Cronkite is a segment producer on the network's *The Art of Living* program. The 7th USA National ARDF Championships & 4th IARU Region 2 ARDF Championships 9/14-16/2007

From September 14 through 16, radio-orienteers from around the country and visitors from abroad gathered for the USA and International Amateur Radio Union Region 2 ARDF Championships. This year's sponsors were the Santa Barbara Amateur Radio Club and the Los Angeles Orienteering Club. The site was just outside the village of South Lake Tahoe, in the Sierra Mountains near the border between California and Nevada.

General Chair for these Championships was Marvin Johnston KE6HTS, one of North America's ARDF pioneers. A member of USA's first team to the ARDF World Championships (Hungary, 1998), he has been to this event ever since as a competitor or juror. He won medals in competition at the USA ARDF Championships in 2002, 2003 and 2005. He was organizer of the USA ARDF Championships in 2004. The competition courses for this event were in the same forests where the United States Orienteering Federation held its 2003 national championships of classic orienteering with 350 competitors in attendance. The maps were excellent and the course-setter was Bob Cooley KF6VSE, a winner of medals in both classic and radio-orienteering. South Lake Tahoe is 35 miles from Carson City, Nevada, 64 miles from Reno, Nevada and 117 miles from Sacramento, California.

The championships got under way on Friday with practice and equipment testing sessions, followed by a meeting for orientation and rules review. The two-meter contest took place on Saturday, after which all gathered for a banquet in the evening. Sunday's schedule included the 80-meter contest and final awards ceremony, timed to end in mid-afternoon to accommodate those who had to hurry home.

Event headquarters were at Camp Concord in the El Dorado National Forest, near Mount Tallac. It is is fully accredited by the American Camping Association. Most of the competitors ate and slept at the camp, to maximize their opportunities to interact with and learn from fellow ARDF enthusiasts. To provide even more learning opportunities, Bob Cooley led an ARDF training camp nearby on September 12 and 13. National ARDF Championships are for individuals only. No teaming or assistance on the course is permitted. Participants are divided into five age categories for males and four age categories for females in accordance with standard IARU rules. Medals for first, second and third places were awarded in each category on each band.

That final item: Close range invisibility possible

Call this one Star Trek come to life. Science Daily reports that a unique computer model designed by a mathematician at the University of Liverpool has shown that it is possible to make objects such as airplanes and submarines appear invisible at close range.

Until now, scientists could only make objects appear invisible from far away. Now, Liverpool mathematician Sébastien Guenneau, together with Dr Frédéric Zolla and Professor André Nicolet from the University of Marseille, using a specially designed computer model called GETDP have proven that objects can also be made to appear invisible from close range when light travels in waves rather than beams.

Scientists have already created an 'invisibility cloak' made out of something called metamaterial. Metamaterial is a creation that has the ability to bend electromagnetic radiation such as visible light, radar or microwaves around a spherical space. This makes an object within this region appear invisible. They also say predict that invisibility will be possible for objects of any shape and size within the next decade. (Science Daily)

Update on Carol WA8YL

It has been a little while since I gave an update on Mom, but some of you have been in contact with us recently, so this might be old news.

A week ago (this dated Sep 16), Mom moved from B-North to Drake Hospital and she wasn't there for very long. Drake realized that she needed more care than they could offer and we decided to transport her to Middletown ICU on Wednesday because B-North didn't have any beds available. During transport, Mom's blood pressure became erratic and the drivers decided to take her to the nearest ER and that was University Hospital. She was stabilized and was admitted to their ICU and has been there ever since. Mel and I are very happy with the care that she is receiving and Mom is showing improvement daily. Keep in mind that she is still very sick, but for the first time in a few weeks, I am hopeful that she will pull through this.

They found that Mom was suffering from two types of Pneumonia bacteria and once properly identified, they are treating her with the specific antibiotics. She is now stable, but they found it necessary to re-intubate (insert ventilator tube) her to ensure that she was receiving full breaths of oxygen in order to get better. They are looking at extubating (taking it out) in the next few days and are trying to wean her off of the machine by lowering the settings. She was off of it completely for about 6 hours today. This is much quicker than they thought that it would take.

We are cautiously optimistic and are fully aware that she still has no kidney function and is now on continuous dialysis and has a weak heart, but she is showing some positive signs of recovery and we are clinging to that. Our goal is to get Mom to where she can (survive and) lead a decent quality of life. Just a sanity check in case any of you think that we are crazy (including myself) and may be putting Mom through a big ordeal to save her life... I had a chance to talk with Mom late last week and we are doing exactly what her wishes are, which is a sigh of relief for us. We have made a lot of tough decisions on her behalf in the past few weeks when she was unable and it is good to know that she would have made the same decisions for herself.

We are very impressed with the staff at University Hospital and have found them to be significantly better than any other hospital that we have experienced. At other hospitals, I felt like I had to be the communicator amongst doctors and and lead the strategy for her care, but at University I am only a spectator and I am thankful for that. They have an aggressive treatment plan and they are executing against the plan. I hope that you continue to keep her in your prayers.
