#### **Technical Committee report**

Hello all:

We keep moving forward with quite a number of items. Progress has been slow at times, as work tends to get in the way of the fun most of the time. So I apologize in advance if some of this appears to be a rehash.

All three VHF repeaters are still on-the-air and working FB. Please use them, and don't hesitate to report back any problems you encounter.

Three of our four CAT-300DX controllers were sent out for repair/maintenance check and have now returned. As time permits, we'll get a CAT controller back on 146.625, and swap out the CAT controller at 146.925 (DVR/phone line issue).

We continue to massage the Arcom controller at our "mothership repeater," 146.67. This has been an interesting experinece and has led to some cool functions like reporting of temperature at the repeater site and linking in the weather radio. It has had its completely frustrating episodes as well, as there are a number of functions we'd like to incorporate that the hardware apparently won't allow. But we'll press on; eventually we'll figure it all out.

By the way, look for a list of user codes for this repeater coming very soon.

Thanks to a donation from Dennis KD8ILY and Cincinnati Public Schools, we have a handful of Motorola Maxtrac/Radius mobiles to evaluate for remote receiver/link purposes. So far, they all seem to work, programming them to the ham bands is next.

Progress continues to move toward getting our recently-assigned UHF repeater on-the-air. It will live at 443.7625 (xmit up 5 Mhz) and will be housed at Hughes HS. We have all the equipment necessary to put this on-the-air, which should keep our initial costs low (always a good thing) and now that we have our controllers back, making it all work as a system will be forthcoming.

By the way, although we meet rather infrequently, if you have an interest in helping out with the repeaters, please don't hesitate to contact me and we'll "put you on the list" so you can be an official member of the OH-KY-IN Technical Committee. Sorry, we have no secret handshakes or decoder rings, Fred won't let us spend the money. <grin>

Lastly, I'd like to thank everyone who has helped out on the Tech Committee this year. The list is too long to mention everyone by name and call, but you should already know who you are. Thanks, everyone.

And special "Thank Yous" go to Harold WB4VOA for some awesome advice, equipment and time helping us keep the repeaters going, and to Dennis KD8ILY, for his assistance with Cincin-nati Public Schools for all the equipment and the cool repeater site they've donated. Again, thank you, gentlemen.

I keep saying it and it has never been more true... Good things continue to happen.

New 60 Meter Info also as ARLB024

Friday, November 18, the FCC published its approval of changes to the US 60M band. Full details of the proceeding may be found at

http://transition.fcc.gov/Daily Releases/Daily Business/2011/db1118/FCC-11-171A1.pdf

In summary:

- (1) Use of the existing 5366.5 kHz (carrier) is removed, replaced by 5357.0 kHz (carrier).
- (2) Maximum ERP increased from 50 to 100 watts PEP.
- (3) Three emission modes (CW, RTTY, Data) are authorized in addition to the existing USB mode.

Please note; these rules changes will be effective 30 days after publication in the Federal Register.

#### Physicians honored for leadership

Caregiver. Educator. Pioneer. Six revered physicians whose lives have exemplified these qual-ities recently were honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award for Medical Education and Ser-vice at the Good Samaritan Hospital Physician Recognition Celebration 2011. Good Samaritan physicians celebrating service milestones also were recognized at the September ceremony.

#### Horacio S. Falciglia MD KA8TVY

When Horacio S. Falciglia MD was recruited to serve as the first neonatologist at Good Samaritan in 1976, he introduced new expertise in neonatal care—including mechanical ventilation—resulting in decreased neonatal mortality and complications. His contributions were recently recognized when he was inducted into the "Hall of Honor" at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center (CCHMC) by the Cincinnati Pediatric Historical Society. Dr. Falciglia served as director of Pediatrics and director of the Mother/Baby Unit at Good Samaritan, and eventually joined the Neonatology faculty at CCHMC. He received international recognition for his re-search on meconium aspiration syndrome, cited in more than 100 scientific articles. Dr. Falciglia is most proud of his children who have followed him into the medical

profession.

Dr. Falciglia received his US callsign in 1984 (renewal due in May 2014). His family, especially his father LU1DFN (SK) and uncle LU6DEC (SK) who was a communications specialist in the Argentinian army (and a CW ace!) were quite active. Dr Falciglia himself was licensed as LU7DAU as a youth and did a course taught by the famous Mariano Abastas LU7EE (SK?). When he came to the US for medical school in New York, he, his father and uncle strung an antenna over the dorm rooftops for him to use an 80m homebrew radio his father built for him. After he came to Cincinnati, he found/made time to enroll in the Oh-Ky-In courses. He especially thanks Howard Wissell WB8QOH who was his teacher, and John Hugentober N8FU (SK) who served as his Elmer. John also masterminded installing a quad antenna at the house. Joining Oh-Ky-In, once licensed, was a given and his membership has been continuous. His only present radio activity is on 2m, but he says he plans to become much more active when he retires

## Ron Moorefield W8ILC receives Allan Severson AB8P Memorial Award posted 11/7/2011

He has been active in the Amateur Radio Emergency Service as long as the Section Manager has been alive, and for that, Ron Moorefield W8ILC of Kettering, Ohio has become the 18th recipient of the Allan Severson AB8P Memorial Award.

The award was presented to Ron during a meeting of the Dayton Amateur Radio Association in Kettering, Ohio on Friday, November 3. Ohio Section Manager Frank J. Piper KI8GW, who made the presentation before a packed house, noted that the award was not only given to Ron for his resume of work, but how Ron carried out his tasks with integrity.

Moorefield was Emergency Coordinator for the Greene/Montgomery county areas from 1963 to 1985. In 1985, Ron was appointed District Emergency Coordinator for Ohio ARES® District 3, and held that same appointment until his announced retirement effective October 1 of this year. Ron still plans to be an effect-tive ARES volunteer in his local group. Ron is also an active liaison in the Ohio VOAD program, and works with the Dayton HamVention® team as well.

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The Allan Severson AB8P Memorial Award is bestowed on an amateur radio operator in the Ohio Section who has demonstrated a continuing dedication to the advancement of amateur radio and to the Ohio Section.

The award had been established in 1992 and was named "Ohio Ham of the Year" until 1999. That year it was renamed after Allen, of Lakewood, Ohio, who became a silent key in 1997. The award winners listed here are all hams who, like Allan Severson, have dedicated themselves to the advancement of the American Radio Relay League in Ohio.

Although AB8P had served the Section as Section Manager and went on to a distinguished career as Great Lakes Division Director on the ARRL National Board of Directors, the annual award announcement only mentions one sentence about him which is part of every memorial award certificate. That sentence quickly demonstrates the reason for the renaming of this award. "Allan's devotion to serve amateur radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio Section leadership."

#### Statehouse happenings

On November 16, 2011 a hearing was held in the Ohio Senate State and Local Government and Veteran's Affairs Committee on each of the amateur radio antenna bills, S.B. 93 and H.B. 158. The hearing was scheduled for the presentation of sponsor testimony on both of the bills. State Government Liaison Nick Pittner K8NAP and Terri Kovalchik N8TLK attended the hearing on behalf of the ARRL.

Representative Stebelton, one of the sponsors of H.B. 158 presented the legislation and indicated his understanding that **S. B. 93**, **which is substantially similar to H.B 158**, **will be withdrawn** in order to minimize the number of hearings necessary to pass the legislation. In his testimony, Representative Stebelton emphasized the importance of amateur radio as a communications resource in times of emergency, the federal regulations (PRB-1) intended to protect the amateur radio service and the fact that similar legislation has been passed in numerous other states. He also noted that the Senate passed very similar legislation in the prior term.

There were a few questions from Committee members, including whether Ham Radio is the same as CB radio and some questions about the 75 foot presumptions of reasonableness for antenna support structure height. In general, comments from committee members, including Chairman Kris Jordan, were very favorable toward the public service provided by radio amateurs and supportive of the Bill. At this point, further hearings in the Senate will likely consider H.B. 158 only. You can view the full text of that bill at

No additional hearings in the Senate have been scheduled at this time.

Mike gave a great talk, and then ended his discussion with "The 7 things each Ham and Club needs to be doing". I was struck with each one of these items, and thought I would share them with you.

In the spirit of David Letterman, I'll give these items in ascending order, feel free to add your own drum page 10

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roll before reading each one....

#7: Be An Elmer

You can share what you have learned over the years with new, upcoming Hams. Not everyone knows everything, but if we pulled all of our knowledge and experiences together, we can help shape the future of Amateur Radio easily.

#6: Try Something New

DXers hate EmComm, EmComm hates DXing...ever heard that? Do you know that working a DX contest will help an EmComm operator improve his/her listening and copying skills? This next year I'm planning to get involved in satellite communication. This hobby has so much to offer. Make 2012 the year you'll try something new!

#5: Get On The Air!

Now this one seems to be self explanatory, but I'm sure there are many of us who just don't make the time to sit down and just play radio! It doesn't have to be for hours at a time, but if your mobile rig is collecting as much dust as that McDonald's cup that has been in your car for the past 6 months, it might be time to fire it up and see who is on the air. We need to keep our frequencies active! There's a lot of commercial interest out there who would love to have our bands. Even the emergency frequencies get looked at from

time-to-time for profit. If we don't use it, we'll lose it!

#4: Don't Build Walls

DXers, EmComm, ARES, RACES, SKYWARN, etc... it seems at times there are walls that get built be-tween our interests. Even sometimes we feel that RF stops at the county line. This plays into #6 a little. Let's try to break down the walls that divide us, our interests, and even the same county or city that has 2 or 3 clubs. Life is too short! #3: Always Improve

We should always strive to improve our operating skills. Maybe this plays with #6 as well. Help out with more public service events. Try to build a project. Join a club you don't currently belong to. The doors waiting to be open are endless.

#2: Drop The Ego!

I am going to put this plain and simple. Drop the Ego! This plays with #4. As your Section Manager since 2009, I have run into more issues simply because some people's egos do not allow them to work well with others. It's that simple. When Mike brought this one up, even he could not seem to find a stopping point to end this topic. 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#### Carving Out Time for Ham Radio de Dan Romanchik KB6NU

His Nov 2011 column, reprinted in Dec 2011 MARC Sparks

On a recent episode of *This Week in Tech* (www.twit.tv), Leo Laporte W6TWT mentions ham radio, and a guest asks him how much time he is spending on the air. Leo, who just recently got his Tech license says "Zero!" and laughs.

This is not uncommon. Lots of people seem to get a ham radio license and then do very little with it. I think one reason for this is that they don't take into account how much time the hobby really can eat up. They get their ticket because it seems like a cool thing to do, but then they have to carve out some time to actually be a ham radio operator. Even if you don't make any of your own gear, set-ting up a station takes

actually be a ham radio operator. Even if you don't make any of your own gear, set-ting up a station takes time, and then there is the operating time, of course. Carving time out of busy schedules—and I would guess that Laporte has a pretty busy schedule being the owner of TWiT—is a challenge. I see things like this all the time. At one ham radio club meeting that I attended, the club vice president asked, "OK, here's the question of the month. How many of you actually got on the air in the past month?" Less than half of those in attendance raised their hands. Geez, I thought to myself, why do they even bother to come to meetings if they don't get on the air?

Making time for ham radio

So, if you're a busy person, how do you make time for ham radio? Well, being the Internet geek that I am, I Googled, "making time for things you love." I got a lot of links to sites that talked about work-life balance and some new-age blogs, but none of them offered much in the way of concrete advice.

Then, I Googled "make time for hobbies" and right off the bat, I found two good articles—7 Creative Ways to Make Time For Your Creative Hobby!

(http://www.exploringwomanhood.com/homelife/hobbies/maketime.htm) and 5 Ways to Make Time for Your Hobby (http://o5.com/5-ways-to-make-time-for-your-hobby). Both articles offered very similar advice. Here are four points that both made:

1. Schedule it. Set aside a specific time during which you're going to do ham radio. Don't let that time get pre-empted.

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- 2. Designate a place in your home for ham radio. Having to set up your radios or dig out your tools every time you want to operate or build something is not much fun and wastes a lot of time. Having a "shack" and a workspace designated for your projects will let you spend more time on the fun stuff.
- 3. Partner up. Arranging to work with another ham will make it harder to blow off ham radio for some other activity. Besides, it's a lot of fun to do things with other hams. If you're a newly licensed ham, find an Elmer. There really are plenty around who would be willing to help you.
- 4. Create a project plan. Setting up an amateur radio station is no small feat. Breaking it down into smaller chunks will make it seem more doable, and you'll get a feeling of accomplishment when you meet your in-between goals.

There's so much to learn and do in amateur radio that it can seem quite overwhelming. I think that's one reason why so many Techs never really get into the hobby and why some experienced hams drift away. I think if you follow the advice above, though, you'll not only find the time to pursue amateur radio, but get a lot more out of it
