Kids Discover Amateur Radio and a Lot More!

Members of the OH-KY-IN Amateur Radio Society had an opportunity to introduce a lot of young folks (and

their parents!) to the wonders of amateur radio at the Cincinnati Museum Center on Saturday, September 24th. Kids got to see amateur radio in action by talking on 2-meter rigs, hearing their names using Morse code, and exploring amateur radio's connection to satellites.

In addition to the various radio stations which were set up, there were displays of radio tubes, QSL card collections, police/fire scanners, and even amateur radio cartoon books which the kids were able to take home with them. OH-KY-IN also had a PowerPoint presentation which showed

in the museum's original Scripps Theater, where long ago folks used to come to watch newsreels during WWII.

Kalaupapa HI Is Site of Second ARRL Remote VE Testing ARRL Contest Update Sept 1, 2011

From the sunny shores of Hawaii's Kalaupapa Peninsula, ARRL Volunteer Examiners gave a remote ARRL VE session on the morning of July 25. Well, at least it was morning in Hawaii, but it was late in the afternoon at ARRL Headquarters. What made this VE session so special that it was only the second VE session to be administered via Internet video feed. The first video VE session -- and the first-ever VE session in Antarctica -- took place in October 2010. Now there are two new radio amateurs in Hawaii's Kalawao County, just in time for the Hawaii QSO Party, August 27-28.

Not only was this VE session special due to its location, only one VE was at Kalaupapa for the exam. "This is where the Internet video feed came into play," explained ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM. "Joe Speroni, AH0A -- who lives in Honolulu but went to the site at his own expense -- was at Kalaupapa, but Bev Yuen, AH6NF, and Ray Moody, AH6LT, were in Honolulu and watching on video. We also had three VEs here at ARRL Headquarters watching via video feed: Penny Harts, N1NAG, Steve Ewald, WV1X, and Rose Anne Lawrence, KB1DMW. These three administer many VE sessions each year here at ARRL HQ."

Kalaupapa is an isolated peninsula located on the island of Molokai in the Hawaiian Islands. From 1866-1969, those Hawaiians who were afflicted with leprosy (today called Hansen's disease) were removed from their families and sent to live at Kalaupapa for the rest of their lives, separated from society. Chosen by the Hawaiian Monarchy for its natural barriers to escape -- including some of the highest sea cliffs in the world and a coastline with high surf and hazardous ocean currents -- the site became a National Historical Park in 1980 with the aim to preserve, protect and interpret more than 200 historic buildings, archeological sites and the incredible stories of the people that lived and died there. Currently, about 90 people – former

patients, Department of Health staff and National Park Service staff -- live in the settlement of Kalaupapa within the park year round.

Speroni, Moody and Yuen said they were pleased to know that Kalaupapa finally has ham radio operators who will be available when their normal communications go down. "There are plans for a permanent station at Kalaupapa," Yuen said. "You will be hearing ham radio operations from the county very soon. A small group of Oahu hams will be going to Kalaupapa to activate Kalawao County for the <u>Hawaii QSO Party</u> the last weekend of August, providing a rare contact for county hunters. While there, they will be assisting the new Technician licensees, and helping them to get on the air."

CQ the OHIO QSO PARTY de K8SCH - meant to go in Sept Q-Fiver

Several club members got together again this year to put K8SCH on the air operating in the Ohio QSO Party on Saturday, August 27.

Since the event was so successful last year, we decided to set up again this year at Ross Park in St. Bernard. With the temperature in the mid 70's and a nice breeze, we couldn't have ordered better weather for the event.

We operated two stations, one on 40 meters and one on both 20 meters and 80 meters. We used dipole antennas for all three bands which worked out rather well and it didn't take much time at all to get them up and then back down.

Although we did run into a computer logging problem that took the 40 meter station down for a bit, the event again was quite successful. Between the two stations, we worked a total of just shy of 600 QSOs. Thanks to everyone who helped out this year. We certainly do plan to do it again next year. Mark your calendar for the Saturday of the fourth full weekend in August next year, maybe you'll be available to join us. Our goal for next year is to work 750 or more QSOs.

+++ Committee will review UHF Band Plan +++

>From ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN:

"In a move designed to demonstrate amateur utilization of the 33 cm. through 9 cm. amateur bands, the ARRL Board established a UHF Band Plan Committee at its July 2011 meeting. This committee, described in Minute 39 of the meeting minutes, has been populated. Vice President Rick Roderick K5UR will be its chair. Remaining members are ARRL CEO Dave Sumner K1ZZ; retired ARRL Chief Technology Officer Paul Rinaldo W4RI; Central Division Vice Director Rod Blocksome K0DAS; and Southwestern Division Vice Director Marty Woll N6VI.

"This committee will work in cooperation with the National Band Plan Threat Assessment committee chaired by International Affairs VP Jay Bellows K0QB."

As outlined in Minute 39, the committee shall present a preliminary report containing recommended Band Plans at the 2012 ARRL Board of Directors Second (July) Meeting. The general charges to the Committee are:

1. To determine current band usage in the United States.

2. To seek input and comments from the amateur community.

3. To consider international issues.

4. To look toward emerging technology and projected future usage.

5. To keep the ad hoc National Broadband Plan Committee apprised of its progress.

6. To, above all else, be conducive to increasing amateur usage in these bands.

The primary purpose of this committee is to map the use of the 33 cm through 9 cm. band segments by amateurs and to determine how best to expand this usage. As directed in item 2, the committee will obtain

input from amateurs on current use as well as of any steps that may be developed to increase our use of these frequencies. +++ FCC Raises Fee for Vanity Call Signs +++

On August 10, the FCC announced via a Final Rule in the *Federal Register* that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 90 cents, from \$13.30 to \$14.20. The new fees take effect 30 days after publication, making September 9, 2011, the first day the new fee is in effect. Earlier this year, the FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order (NPRM), seeking to raise the fee for Amateur Radio vanity call signs.

+++ US Officially Proposes New Amateur Band +++

The World Radio Conference (WRC 2012) will address Agenda item 1.23 that will "consider an allocation of about 15 kHz in parts of the band 415-526.5 kHz to the amateur service on a secondary basis, taking into

account the need to protect existing services . . ." The US proposal to this agenda item is a proposal to make the frequencies 461-469 and 471-478 kHz to secondary amateur use. Corrected from orig*

This is a simplification of the technical wording of the US proposal; however, amateurs have demonstrated the ability to coexist in harmony with primary uses such as currently exist on this proposed band. The

bottom line is that our Department of State will recommend that amateurs receive a new amateur band just below the AM broadcast band.

ARRL Simulated Emergency Test October 1 & 2

The ARRL Simulated Emergency Test is a nationwide exercise in emergency communications, admini-stered by ARRL Field Organization Leaders including Emergency Coordinators, District Emergency Coordinators, Section Emergency Coordinators and Net Managers. Many other Section Leaders like the Section Manager and the Section Traffic Manager may have a hand in planning the exercises and/or reviewing the results.

Amateur Radio Emergency Service® (ARES®), National Traffic System (NTS), Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) and other public-service oriented groups can be involved. The SET weekend gives communicators the opportunity to focus on the emergency-communications capability within your community while interacting with NTS nets. Although the main SET weekend this year is October 1 and 2, local and section-wide exercises may be held throughout the fall season.

During September, the ARRL is among dozens of organizations and agencies taking part in National Preparedness Month. "The Ready Campaign," produced by the Ad Council in partnership with the US Dept of Homeland Security (DHS), is aimed at making citizen preparedness "a priority for every city, every neigh-borhood and every home" in the US. The ARRL encourages you to consider this year's Simulated Emergency Test and preparations for it as a demonstration of Amateur Radio's readiness and as an active participant in National Preparedness Month. http://www.ready.gov/, http://www.ready.gov/america/npm10/index.html

Purpose of SET

As you conduct your Simulated Emergency Test, please keep these overall purposes in mind:

1. To find out the strengths and weaknesses of ARES, NTS, RACES and other groups in providing emergency communications.

2. To provide a public demonstration--to served agencies such as the American Red Cross, the emergency management agency and through the news media--of the value to the public that Amateur Radio provides, particularly in time of need.

3. To help radio amateurs gain experience in communications using standard procedures and a variety of modes under simulated-emergency conditions.
