

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On May 1, Dragan Pavlovic YT3PDT completed his registration process for **Logbook of The World** (<u>LoTW</u>), becoming the **50,000th person to take advantage of the** ARRL's online QSL confirmation system. According to ARRL Membership and Volunteer Programs Manager Dave Patton NN1N, there are more than 3500 individuals from outside the US in the process of obtaining a digital certificate, and more than 1800 individuals inside the US who have started the certificate process, but not yet finished.

Earlier this year, the ARRL and *CQ* Communications <u>announced</u> that the ARRL will provide support for *CQ*-sponsored operating awards by LoTW, beginning with the WPX Award. This project has <u>entered the beta testing phase</u> with a select group of hams and, barring any unforeseen circumstances, is on track to be launched to the Amateur Radio community this month.

"Radio amateurs around the world consider LoTW to be the 'must have' awards and electronic confirmation system," Patton said. "We look forward to planned improvements and upgrades, and we are gratified that so many people have helped the system grow and become more and more useful."

Greetings!

I'm sitting here in the office/shack, wondering if there ever will be a greater week than this for Amateur Radio in the Ohio Section. Besides being the week of the Dayton Hamvention^R, we had another goal achieved today..... As of approx. 1:20 PM today, several of us who worked on House Bill 158 and the versions prior, stood in the office of Ohio Governor John R. Kasich as he signed Ohio House Bill 158 (aka "PRB-1 for Ohio") into law, along with Bill Sponsors Rep. Gerald Stebelton (R-5th District) and Rep. Mark Okey (D-61st District), and State Senator Tim Shaffer (R-31st District). Representing the ARRL and Ohio Radio Amateurs with me were Rick Swain-KK8O, Bill Carpenter-AA8EY, Steve Katz-N8WL and Constance Barsky-WD8ODC. ARRL Great Lakes Division Director James Weaver K8JE joined us as well for the signing. Regretfully, State Government Liaison Nick Pittner K8NAP *couldn't* attend the signing, as he is *en route* home from a great vacation out west. When asked if we should hold the signing upon his return, Nick said "No way, let's get this signed before Hamvention!"

The law will go into effect 90 days from today. During this time you will hear from SGL Pittner and me on how to use this law to its fullest effect. Stay tuned.

This day could not have come without the work of **many** individuals who put in time away from work and other personal responsibilities. SGL Pittner and I spent many hours in the hallways of the Ohio Statehouse working with legislators to keep the Bills moving. We hit a few snags and had to start all over in 2011,

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Attention Federal Employees: ARRL Approved for 2012 Combined Federal Campaign! 4-26-12

For the past 11 years, the US Office of Personnel Management has designated the ARRL to participate in the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), the annual giving campaign for federal employees. In that time, this campaign for federal government civilian employees, US Postal Service workers and members of the military has generated almost \$192,000 for ARRL programs. The CFC provides an easy way to support the ARRL's effort to represent its members and all radio amateurs. Similar to the United Way, the CFC encourages individuals employed in all branches of the federal government to pledge by payroll deduction to non-profit organizations of their choice. The ARRL encourages eligible radio amateurs to consider the League when designating campaign recipients. Payroll deduction through the CFC is an easy



way for participants to support ARRL over and above their annual membership. Such contributions support programs that are not funded by member dues, enriching ARRL's ability to serve its members and all of Amateur Radio.

Those wishing to select the ARRL to receive all or part of their payroll deductions should designate organization 10099 when completing their CFC donor forms. Donations to the ARRL can be designated for Diamond Club contributions, the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund, the ARRL Education & Technology Program or the Historic Preservation Fund. Donors may likewise elect to make unrestricted contributions to the League. One important note: Since the CFC does not provide the ARRL with the names of individual donors, the ARRL Development Office would appreciate a copy of the donor form to ensure that each contribution is applied according to the donor's wishes and the contribution or pledge can be properly acknowledged.

ARLB009 FCC Seeks Higher Vanity Call Sign Fee 5-7-12

The FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) on May 4, seeking to raise the fee for Amateur Radio vanity call signs. The NPRM can be found in PDF format on the web at,

http://transition.fcc.gov/Daily Releases/Daily Business/2012/db0504/FCC-12-48A1.pdf

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Currently, a vanity call sign costs \$14.20 and is good for 10 years; the new fee, if the FCC plan goes through, will go up to \$15 for 10 years, an increase of 80 cents. The FCC is authorized by the Communications Act of 1934 (as amended) to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program.


The vanity call sign fee has fluctuated over the 14 years of the current program -- from a low of \$11.70 in 2007 to a high of \$70 (as first proposed in the FCC's 1994 Report and Order). The FCC said it anticipates some 14,300 Amateur Radio vanity call sign "payment units," or applications, during the next fiscal year, collecting \$214,500 in fees from the program.

The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new term. The first vanity call sign licenses issued under the current Amateur Radio vanity call sign program that began in 1996 came up for renewal six years ago.

Those holding vanity call signs issued prior to 1993 are exempt from having to pay the vanity call sign regulatory fee at renewal, as Congress did not authorize the FCC to collect regulatory fees until 1996. Such "heritage" vanity call sign holders do not appear as vanity licensees in the FCC Amateur Radio database.

Amateur Radio licensees may file for renewal only within 90 days of their license expiration date. All radio amateurs must have an FCC Registration Number (FRN) before filing any application with the Commis-sion. Applicants can obtain an FRN by going to the ULS web site at, http://wireless.fcc.gov/uls/index.htm?

and pointy stick lives for the people who handle your carefully-sorted parts and put them back in the wrong boxes or trays. An unsuspecting buyer gets home and begins work on a project only to find that the ninth part out of ten is mismatched. At next year's hamfest, *you* get blamed for it. **Benevelonians** - Particularly fond of new hams and kids in general, these fine folks take the hamfest role of doting uncles and aunts. No matter how shy the child or unsure the novice, a Benevelonian will always come up with some trinket or extra part to give away or add to the sale. "I've got just the thing for YOU!" they say, eyes twinkling, producing a perfectly chosen gift or gadget for which they won't accept a cent.

Burrowers - As we all know, the best bargains are often on the floor under the tables so a Burrower gets down on hands and knees, no matter how crowded the aisle, proceeding to root through every single box and bag, spreading and sorting the collection, creating chaos and convincing your real customers to cross the aisle to "come back later". They will then offer one-tenth the asking price on a single coil of wire and leave it on the table when you don't sell it to them.

Explainers - An inquisitive buyer inevitably asks the one question about an item to which you don't know the answer. "Will this work with my 1983 Festalon Maglerator?" 

+ ARDF Update: Register Now for USA ARDF Championships in So California (may be too late - Ye Ed)

Some call it foxhunting, but no animals are ever harmed. The hunt trophies are gold, silver and bronze medals. Will you win one this year?

The biggest event of the year is coming soon for fans of on-foot hidden transmitter hunting, also called fox tailing, radio-orienteering and Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF). Beginners and experts will gather in the mountains east of San Diego for the 12th Annual USA championships during the week and the weekend after Memorial Day. There they will test their abilities, refine their equipment and learn the best techniques from one another. Some will take home medals.

Activities will get under way on Wednesday and Thursday, May 30-31, when an optional two-day "training camp" will take place. This is a wonderful opportunity for immersion in bearing-taking and course strategy, with experts to help. Orienteering maps with elevation contours and color-coded terrain markings are new to many on-foot foxhunters, but the camp will instill confidence in using them to navigate in unfamiliar forests.

Top finishers in USA ARDF Championships can qualify to attend ARDF World Champion ships, scheduled for Sept 10-16 in Kopaonik, Serbia. The official championships opening will take place on Friday, June 1. Friday's schedule also includes additional practice and equipment testing sessions, followed by a meeting for orientation and rules review. The 2 meter contest will take place in the woods on Saturday, and a banquet and awards ceremony will follow that evening. Sunday's schedule includes the 80 meter contest and another awards ceremony, timed to end inin mid-afternoon to accommodate those who must hurry home.

This year's primary sponsor is the **Los Angeles Orienteering Club**, with assistance from **San Diego Orienteering** and the **mobile transmitter hunters** of San Diego County. Marvin Johnston KE6HTS, one of North America's ARDF pioneers -- is General Chair of the organizers. A member of USA's first team to the ARDF World Championships in **Hungary back in 1998**, Johnston has returned many times since, both as a competitor or juror. He won medals in competition at the USA ARDF Championships in 2002, 2003 and 2005, and organized the USA ARDF Championships in **2004** and **2007**.

National ARDF Championships are for individuals only; no teaming or assistance on the course is permitted. Participants are divided into **six age categories** for males and five age categories for females, in accordance with standard IARU rules. Medals for first, second and third place will be awarded in each category.

Results of these championships, as well as those of <u>last year's championships</u> in Albuquerque, New Mexico, will determine who will receive invitations to take on radio-orienteers from about two dozen countries later this year. ARDF Team USA 2012 will travel to <u>Kopaonik, Serbia</u> for the <u>16th ARDF World Championships</u>, September 10-16. A maximum of three competitors in each age-gender category may be on a nation's team.

What Is It Like?

International ARDF competitions have taken place in Europe for more than 30 years. Foxhunters have represented the US for more than a decade, but most

hams still don't know much about the sport. I am often asked "What is it like to compete at our national champion-ships?" First, understand that anyone with rea- sonable physical abilities can participate. A ham license is not required and there are no age limits, but you must be able to run or walk through the forest *and* carry your radio direction finding (RDF) gear for 5-10 kilometers. The medal winners will be covering each kilometer in 15 minutes or less. It's best if you have your own handheld RDF sets for each course, AM (or FM) on 2 meters and CW on 80 meters. If you don't, check with the organizers in advance to find out if gear will be available for loan. Measuring tape Yagis and offset attenuators are easy to construct, and they work well for on-foot trans- mitter tracking on 2 meters. Small loop-and-rod antennas are ideal for 80 meters.

Course operations are in accordance with <u>IARU rules</u>, which are uniform throughout the world. As a competitor, you will be assigned a starting number by lot. The lowest numbers go first in the 2 meter event on Saturday, and last on Sunday in the 80 meter competition. Competitors start at exact five minute intervals. You may be starting with up to four others, but they will all be in different categories.

Ten minutes before your start time, you will receive your orienteering map and, if you wish, you can tape it to a map board that you provide. You will clear and check your <u>electronic scoring tag</u>. Five minutes before start, you will get your receiver/antenna set, which will have been impounded up until that time. You may not turn it on, but you can approach the starting line. Timed tones will give you a "GO" to start at the appointed time. You will run up the marked starting corridor to the end, at which point you will be out

of sight of the waiting competitors and you may turn on your receiver. From then on, it's up to you to find all of your two, three, four or five required transmitters (depending on your category) and get to the finish line.

Each of the five fox transmitters is on for 60 seconds at a time in numbered order, and then the cycle repeats. Fox #1 sends "MOE" continuously in Morse code, then #2 sends "MOI," #3 sends "MOS" and so forth. You don't need to know CW, because the number of dits tells you which fox is on.

An electronic scoring box attached to an orange and white orienteering flag is close to each fox transmitter. You do not have to find the actual transmitter or antenna, just find the flag and dip your scoring stick into the box. The transmitters may be attended, but the attendants won't give any clues. You may not make radio transmissions or ask for assistance from others on the course, unless you are injured and need medical help.

You may find your foxes in any order. Your map will have the start marked on it with a triangle, and the finish marked with concentric circles. Use it to figure out approximately where the foxes are, and then pick a route that gets to each -- and to the end -- with least distance traveled, to minimize your time. Try to deduce which required fox is farthest from the finish and go for that one first, and so on. Keep track of your position on the map at all times so you don't get lost. If you lose your place or lose your map, you can take bearings on the transmitter at the finish (which is on a different frequency) to help you get home. Keep an eye on your watch. You will be told the time limit for the days course (usually in the two to three hour range) and you must get to the finish before that time elapses or you will be disqualified. If time gets short, you may have to forego bagging that last radio fox.

There is another corridor at the end, leading to the finish line. Be sure to run the length of that corridor so that those waiting can cheer you and take your picture. You did it!

DXNews: 706T Yemen operation approved for DXCC over protests of Israeli hams

Over complaints that were voiced on QRZ.com and other public websites by some Israeli hams, the ARRL DXCC Awards Desk has approved the current 706T operation from Yemen for DXCC credit. Amateur Radio Newsline's Bruce Tennant K6PZW in Los Angeles, is here with more: (greatly edited by $ye \mathcal{E}d$)

A small but vocal number of Israeli hams have been arguing on-line that the 706T from Yemen should not be allowed for DXCC because the operators refused to make contact with 4X and 4Z prefix hams. They note that Israel has no banned countries list and as such refusal of the 706T operators to contact them was at least a violation of the principals and the spirit of the DXCC program. Snip<...

The 7O6T operation reportedly has the support of 3 major Yemenese government ministries (edit & snip). As such it is a pretty good guess that not recognizing Israeli stations was a decree imposed by Yemen on the 7O6T operating team and not one of their own choosing. Snip<...Discussion ended abruptly on Saturday, May 5th when ARRL Awards Branch Manager Bill Moore, NC1L, issued a news release stating that the current 7O6T operation from Yemen along with the earlier 6O3A DXpedition to Somalia have been granted DXCC approval. Radio & Scouting: BSA announces new Morse Code Interpreter Strip

The Boy Scouts of America have just announced a new "Interpreter Strip" for Morse Code. An "Interpreter Strip" on the uniform means that the Scout or adult leader is able to communicate in a particular language. Amateur Radio Newsline's Mark Abramovich NT3V in Philadelphia, explains:

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Those older Scouts and former Scouts among you may remember the Boy Scout requirements that said a Scout had to learn Morse Code or signal flags to send and receive a message.

And, even though that requirement has disappeared and Morse Code is no longer mandatory to get any amateur radio license in the United States, the BSA is reviving Morse Code as a "language" worth learning.

You can probably credit Jim Wilson K5ND for getting this one from concept to reality. Snip<...

So how does a boy earn it?

Wilson says there are three requirements, the first....

"It's carrying on a 5-minute conversation in Morse Code at a speed of at least 5 words per minute," Wilson explains.

"And, then the second one, copying correctly a 2-minute message sent in Morse Code at a minimum of 5-words-perminute.

"And, copying of course means writing the message down as it's received. And, then, three, sending a 25-word written document in Morse Code at a minimum of 5 words per minute."
