ARLB020 Vanity Call Sign Fee to Increase September 4

On August 3, the FCC announced via a Final Rule in the *Federal Register* that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 80 cents, from \$14.20 to \$15. The new fees take effect 30 days after publication, making September 4, 2012, the first day the new fee is in effect. Earlier this year, the FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order (NPRM), seeking to raise the fee for Amateur Radio vanity call signs.

The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new 10 year term **big snip** >8

ARLB021 Summer Section Manager Election Results Announced

Two Section Manager elections this summer were decided by member balloting: ARRL Connecticut Section Manager Betsey Doane K1EIC was re-elected to a new term, and John Mueller K2BT was elected as the new ARRL Western New York Section Manager. New terms of office start October 1, 2012. Ballots were counted at ARRL Headquarters on Tuesday, August 21.

Doane, of Shelton, received 493 votes. Her opponent -- Charles Motes Jr K1DFS of Plainville, received 214 votes. Doane has served as Connecticut Section Manager since December 1991. In 2012, she received the 2012 George Hart Distinguished Service Award and the EmComm Mentor of the Year Award.

In Western New York, John Mueller K2BT of Falconer was elected to his first term as Section Manager, with 416 votes. Incumbent Western New York Section Manager Steve Ryan N2ITF of Ashville received

361 votes. Mueller has been club president of the Chautauqua County Amateur FM Association, and he has served as an Emergency Coordinator, Instructor and Volunteer Examiner.

Puerto Rico will get a new Section Manager starting October 1: Rene Fonseca NP3O of Fajardo will take over from Roberto Jiminez KP4AC, who has served as Section Manager since 2007. Jiminez decided not to run for another term of office.

The following incumbent ARRL Section Managers did not face opposition and were declared elected for their next two-year terms of office, beginning October 1, 2012: Ed Stuckey AI7H, Idaho; Skip Jackson KS0J, Minnesota; Lynn Nelson W0ND, North Dakota; **Frank Piper KI8GW**, Ohio; Kevin O'DellN0IRW, Oklahoma; David Fowler K4DLF, Southern Florida; Fred Kleber K9VV, US Virgin Islands. Chris Stallkamp W0ADZ will start an 18 month term of office as South Dakota Section Manager.

ARLB022 FCC Releases Congressionally Mandated Study on Amateur Radio

On August 20 -- in response to a Spring 2012 Congressional directive -- the Federal Communications Com-mission released its findings on the Uses and Capabilities of Amateur Radio Service Communications in Emergencies and Disaster Relief: Report to Congress Pursuant to Section 6414 of the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012.

This report contains the FCC's "review of the importance of emergency Amateur Radio Service communi-cations relating to disasters, severe weather and other threats to lives and property in the United States; and recommendations for enhancements in the voluntary deployment of Amateur Radio operators in disaster and emergency communications and disaster relief efforts; and recommendations for improved integration of Amateur Radio operators in the planning and furtherance of initiatives of the federal government." It also required "that the study identify impediments to enhanced Amateur Radio Service communications and provide recommendations regarding the removal of such impediments." . huge snip >8

His quiet work in the Ohio Statehouse the past several years gave Amateur Radio operators in the Ohio Section a new set of legislative tools focused on antennas. For that work, ARRL State Government Liaison

Nick Pittner K8NAP of Plain City was made the 19th recipient of the Allan Severson Memorial Award. The award was presented to Nick at the ARRL Ohio State Convention, held at the Columbus Hamfest on August 11. The Allan Severson Memorial Award is bestowed on an amateur radio operator in the Ohio Section who has demonstrated a continuing dedication to the advancement of amateur radio and to the Ohio Section.

Usually one Ohio Section member is awarded per year and usually at the Ohio Section Conference in September. The award was established in 1992 and named "Ohio Ham of the Year" until 1999. That year it was re-named after Allan, of Lakewood OH, who became a silent key in 1997. The award winners listed here are all hams who, like Allan Severson, have dedicated themselves to the advancement of the American Radio Relay League in Ohio.

Although Allan served the Section as Section Manager and went on to a distinguished career as Great Lakes Division Director on the ARRL National Board of Directors, the annual award announcement only mentions one sentence about him which is part of every memorial award, certificate. That sentence quickly

demonstrates the reason for the renaming of this award. "Allan's devotion to serve amateur radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio Section leadership."

2012 ARRL Field Day Logs Posted (08/27/2012)

More than 2600 submissions have been received for the 2012 running of **ARRL Field Day**. According to ARRL Field Day Manager Dan Henderson, N1ND, this is yet great showing in the number of entries received for what is one of Amateur Radio's most popular on-the-air operating events. The combined list of Logs Received for Field Day has been **posted online**. The list includes all logs submitted via the **www.b4h.net** website, as well as those submitted via e-mail and US Mail.

Because Field Day is not a "Cabrillo-format" event, there is no automated robot for processing entries. When you go to the website to look to see that your submission was received, look near the bottom of the page under "Other Reports." Click on the link to open the PDF for the 2012 listings. If you find your listing is missing, please contact Henderson via e-mail or by phone 860-594-0200. If you find a typographical error in your listing -- or if your log is marked as a "Checklog" -- please contact Kathy Allison, KA1RWY, via e-mail. Logs marked as "Checklog" indicate that required necessary information is missing that is needed to properly process your entry. All problems must be resolved by Friday, August 31.

Henderson explained that the current list only shows general categories; the various sub-categories are added when the data is merged into the master database. Claimed scores or bonuses are also not included, as these are not publicized until the results are officially released. The results from the 2012 ARRL Field Day will be posted online on or around November 1, as well as in the December issue of *QST*. The 2013 ARRL Field Day is scheduled for June 22-23.

North Carolina Teen Named Recipient of ARRL's 2011 Hiram Percy Maxim Award



Derek Brown W4DTB of Chapel Hill NC was named the recipient of the 2011 Hiram Percy Maxim Award. Brown, 14, has been licensed since 2010 and holds an Amateur Extra class license.

Derek first became interested in Amateur Radio after reading an article in *Make Magazine*. "After I read the ARRL Ham Radio License Manual, I went to the local club, the Orange County Radio Amateurs (NCOCRA) to take my Technician test," he told the ARRL. "That same evening, I met my Elmer, Bruce Meier N1LN, who inspired me to finish the next two tests. He helped me build a station that included my first radio that I bought at a swap meet. With his help, I put up a vertical antenna in my back yard. Unfortunately, a tree knocked down the antenna about two weeks ago and broke the mounting

bracket, so I'll be offline until after we get the replacement parts."

Meier recalled meeting Derek when he first came in to take his Technician exam in September 2010: "Derek had just turned 14. He had discovered Amateur Radio and was starting to get involved. His interest quickly grew, and by November 2010, he had his General ticket and then in March 2011, his Extra. In February 2011, Derek and his father went to a hamfest and found his first rig. Since Derek lives in an antenna-restricted area, he started to research different stealth antennas. As he wanted to start to work on his WAS, DXCC and WAC awards, and potentially get in involved in contesting (he got exposed to contesting at my QTH), he wanted something beyond stealth. So because of the woods behind his house, he was able to put up a vertical antenna and not bother any of the neighbors. He was now on the air."

Meier told the ARRL that Derek started out with SSB, but because of his skills in computers and computer programming, he became interested in the digital modes. "Derek modified his radio (by himself) and interfaced The 2 Fivez, OhKyIn ARS September 2012 page 12

an interface board to enable the necessary control signals, wired up a home brew soundcard interface and was then able to operate digital modes," Meier explained. "He now operates PSK 31, RTTY, PSK 63, Olivia 250, JT35 and even SSTV. Not bad for a 14 year old!" Derek is working on his CW skills, and recently earned his DXCC Award and only needs Vermont to complete his Worked All States Award. He also enjoys operating on the satellite modes, as well as developing software for his local HSMM Mesh.

Meier said that Derek competed with him and his team of operators in the 2011 CQ WW SSB contest. "We operated as a Multi/Two entry and were fortunate to place first in North America," he said. "Derek has also operated from his own home in CQ WPX SSB Contest, The ARRL Rookie Roundup and several other contests."

Derek is also involved in Public Service activities. Meier's wife, Laurie Meier N1YXU was ARES Emergency Coordinator for Orange County NC (she and Bruce are now Assistant ECs). Through them, Derek became interested in public service activities and started to take the various ICS courses. He has now taken and passed ICS 100, 200, 700, 800 and IS-3. Meier said that Derek is ready to help with both ARES drills, Public Service events and ARES activations

Derek is an active member of NCOCRA and his local ARES® group. He has worked with the club's public relations officer to revamp the club's website. He is the founder of the Youth Amateur Radio Club of America (YARCA), which aims to further youth in Amateur Radio; one of YARCA's initial target audien-ces is Scout troops. The site includes license test training and a Boy Scout Radio Merit Badge Workshop. Derek said he is currently planning for YARCA to hold a Badge Day for local Boy and Cub Scouts. He is also an ARRL Public Information Officer (PIO). When not on the radio, Derek spends time as a Computer Science intern, where he is creating computer programs in a variety of languages. He is also a Lincoln-Douglas debater and will travel to tournaments across the country this year. He will enter his freshman year at Durham Academy in Durham NC this fall.

The <u>Hiram Percy Maxim Award</u> is given to an ARRL member under the age of 18. It is intended to provide a tangible reward to those deserving young amateurs who contribute their time, skills and energies daily through their commitment to Amateur Radio. As models for their peers, and inspirations to us all, these fine young people are highly visible boosters of Amateur Radio awareness. The ARRL continues to recognize and encourage their hard work and contributions at every opportunity.

Nikola Tesla lab appeal raises \$\$ quickly -CNN 8-21-12 & funding site 8-29

8< snip Matthew Inman (creator of *The Oatmeal*)'s previous experience with the IndieGoGo crowdfunding site stemmed from a potential lawsuit and his subsequent campaign to raise money for the National Wildlife Federation and the American Cancer Society. This current effort, bluntly titled "Let's Build a Goddamn Tesla Museum," exploded after it was launched, raising more than \$750,000 within 5 days.

Total stood at \$1,161,474 by 11 AM on Aug 29. The goal is to raise enough money to buy the property and begin efforts to restore the facility. The asking price is \$1.6 million, and Inman's goal of \$850,000 would be matched by a New York state grant for the same amount, raising a total of \$1.7 million. Inman said he was shocked by how much, and how quickly, people have donated to save Tesla's lab Wardenclyffe. **snip** >8
