Happy New Year everyone! I believe it's important to know where we have been in order to plan where we want to be. So I took the month of December to think about what was attempted and what was achieved in 2012. We had our first Statewide Simulated Emergency Test. We brought back an All Ohio ARES Conference. Team W8SGT brought back a statewide HF net. Gary NJ8BB was appointed as digital net manager

and a net was put in place. Any of which could have died without your participation and support. I am taking the month of January to think of some goals for ARES in 2013. As most of you know by now, my door is always open. If you have any suggestions or comments, put it up on the ARES blog here

If you'd rather call me on the phone or send me an email, you're more than welcome to do so.

If you review last year's weekly Ohio SEC Notes & Stuff from either email or the Ohio Section website, you'll see we focused on FEMA Training. The primary reason for this is to meet or exceed the needs of our served agencies. Since October 2011, the Ohio Section focused on the ARES Leaders to take four free online FEMA courses and submit the proper documentation to ASEC Scott Phillips N8SX so they may be added to the training database.

This year we'll focus on the rank and file volunteer. January 1st was "opening day" for the collection of FEMA training certificates or transcripts from each and every volunteer in the Ohio Section. I thank the dozens of volunteers who have submitted them to ASEC Scott N8SX thus far. I know there are volunteers out there who have completed anywhere between 1 and 250 FEMA courses! I would like to recognize you for your hard work and dedication. I am asking all volunteers to submit electronic copies of your FEMA training certificates or transcript so you can be added to the training database. Feel free to contact Scott N8SX at n8sx@arrl.net should you have any questions.

~HOT~ The ARRL Emergency Communications Advisory Committee is asking for our help. They would like to see examples of ARES identification that are currently being used across the country. I asked for clarification and they're looking for badges like picture IDs etc. They're not looking for the ARRL name badge and membership card. While I do not have all the facts, it's conceivable the ARRL is gathering

information to create an ID badge standard. I am asking amateur radio volunteers in Ohio to respond with picture ID cards (or equivalent) currently being used. I do have one small request, please carbon copy me on anything you send to Mr. Cross. This way I am in the loop and can render assistance if need be.

The ARRL Emergency Communications Advisory Committee (ECAC) would like to see what kinds of badges are being used around the country for ARES (Amateur Radio Emergency Service) members. Notes from the Section Traffic Manager

Last month I mentioned the end of the world rumors and NASA's debunking of those rumors. Well, we now know that NASA was right and that the world did not end on December 21 or 22 or you obviously would not be reading this. At least I hoped you would be able to read this, as I am actually continuing my research and starting to do this on December 13 thinking that if the world doesn't make it I will still have written this.

However, I want to give you more information about the possibility and effects of an EMP, where it could come from and how it could affect your radios and propagation. My research suggests that there are three possible sources of an EMP. They are a nuclear explosion, a solar storm and to a lesser degree a very close lightning

strike. *Long* complete explanation of EMPs & what cause them.

I have found very little about what actions might be considered in order to protect sensitive radio and electronic equipment in the event of an EMP or a solar event. All I can think of is a well shielded metal enclo-sure, like a box that is grounded. I have read where a washing machine, a dryer and even metal garbage cans have been suggested for shielding. Would these methods provide a Faraday cage or shielded protection? I haven't been able to determine what would be the best thing to do.

The Faraday cage or shielding is best if it made from a continuous fairly thick metal enclosure that is a very good conductor of electricity such as copper or aluminum. It ideally should have no holes or gaps in its surface and all sides should make electrical contact. That would be the ideal shield, but a lesser shield may be more practical and offer sufficient protection at least until a better shield can be procured.

If you are interested I would suggest you do some research of our own. Suggested search terms would be EMP, Faraday shielding, solar storm.

I do not profess to be an expert on this subject and this information has been obtained through internet research. Regardless of those ex-military personnel who claim to know it all, you would be wise *not to rely on the military propaganda*. Do your own research on the subject and learn to be prepared.

If you do nothing else I would suggest that you go to the ARRL lightning protection page and read the comprehensive four part series on protecting your gear and the information there on the potential of EMP. Use this link to read this series of articles: http://www.arrl.org/lightning-protection.

Minutes of December 2012 Board of Directors meeting
