There were a variety of highlights of the last month.

The President announced that Bryan Hoffman was to have given the program this evening, but had to be in Atlanta instead. Therefore the business part of the meeting would be held first, & then a video on Standing Wave Ratios would be shown & that attendees could leave at the end of the business meeting or at any later time, as the video was rather long. The Minutes of the August meeting were corrected to include: "A check for \$1058.03 had been received from the Red, White & Blue Ash people, in addition to the \$306 tips received. Old Business: On September 13 there is a bike ride; 3 or 4 additional communicators are needed. There are 4 routes. The Hamfest is September 21. Much help is needed. Set-up is on Saturday September 20 from 3 PM to 6 PM & beginning at 6:30 AM on Sunday. The Fest starts at 8 AM. There is a testing session at 8:30 AM & Tom Delaney will have an ARRL Forum at 10 AM. Support HR 4969 which would extend PRB 1 to CCCR (Condominiums). New Business: A Nominating Committee is needed. It needs to report to the November Meeting with the election in December. Nominations from the floor can be made at the November meeting. Up for election: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, & one Director. # FROM THE SECTION EMERGENCY COORDINATOR By Stan Broadway N8BHL broadways@standi.com 8< snip ...

**Doing it in October – the 2014 SET**. OK, here's the story- the Ohio Section is going to do a SET Oct 4! There are so many possibilities, but I want to stick to some simple goals:

- 1. Learn to operate in your county using the Ohio Section Emergency Response Plan (OSERP).
- 2, Activate your members & use this as an opportunity to test communications in your county (voice, digital, MESH, other) as well as your ability to send & receive traffic from the Ohio traffic system.
- 3. This is an opt-in or opt-out deal. If your county does its own SET or has a large exercise on tap, go for it! If you do not, I'd hope this is a great opportunity to test your plans! It shouldn't last long, & focuses solely on our ability to set up communications in our county.
- 4. The exercise should be launched, controlled & ended by one point (State EOC/ W8SGT) for consistency & timing purposes.
- 5. The exercise must as a result be a situation that would theoretically affect each county. Scenario: Total failure of the Ohio MARCS system. As you should know, many public safety agencies depend on this digital trunked 800 system. While a complete statewide failure is unlikely, a regional outage is more likely, particularly in light of a flood or tornado event that would destroy towers & land line connectivity. For our equal opportunity SET, we'll theoretically take down the state.

SEC will alert all District ECs by phone & kick off the exercise. Subsequent messages will be sent via phone, HF nets & VHF if reachable from the state EOC. Each participating county will set up a control station at their EOC. Then, as the situation grows, we'll set up a "County Control Station", & other control stations as needed. That's the over-simplified story!

Steps you can take now- most important, READ the *OSERP*! Train at your county on how it's structured. It is NOT hard & fast, but is a guideline to set up a consistent statewide operation. Contact your EMA, & see if it's possible for you to have access to the EOC ham station on Oct 4. It shouldn't last past mid-afternoon at the latest. Likewise, you might want to use this opportunity to set up stations at your other critical locations (without interrupting their daily workload.) It can be a good demonstration of capabilities of amateur radio in a large-scale event. We hope it'll be a good test for you!

The Ohio Section has always been near the very top of the list when it comes to evaluation & point totals! Let's keep it that way and learn a little in the process!

ham Paul Jordan KD8JDF got a head start. He recently returned from an intense week long radio camp, put on by Courage Handihams, where he immersed himself in Extra class theory. Paul says he believes he is more prepared than ever before to pass the exam. He said that a message from FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate KK4INZ was a high point of the week.

Fugate said in part, "I encourage you to join local organizations such as your local amateur radio emergency service team & Skywarn. In a disaster, we need amateur radio operators of all abilities who can support their communities in their time of need. As an amateur radio operator, you can play a key role in your community's response & recovery from disaster. But we can only do that if we are prepared & trained." Southwest Ohio hams who have disabilities have told me that they are often excluded from participation in the very activities that provide the training & preparation that Fugate talked about. Often, small changes are all that are necessary to make your activities more inclusive. These changes typically benefit everyone, not just people with disabilities. If you would like to explore things your club &/or ARES organization can do to be more inclusive, get in touch with me or invite me to talk about this at one of your meetings.

(Note: Handihams is an ARRL Affiliated Club. They have a long standing relationship with ARRL & work closely together on disability issues.)

OH-KY-IN also holds licensing classes. The 9 week Extra class began Monday, Sept 22 & runs through Nov17. The 5 week Tech & General Classes begin Monday Oct 20 & run through Nov 17. All sessions begin at 7:00 PM & end at 9:00. Exam opportunities follow all 3 classes on Saturday Nov 22 at 9 AM. (walk-ins always welcome). When Scouts want to meet young people from another country, they usually think of attending a World Jamboree. But few people realize that each year more than half a million Scouts & Guides "get together" over the airwaves for the annual Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA). The World Scout Bureau reported that the 2010 JOTA had just over 700,000 Scout participants from nearly 6,000 amateur radio stations! Modern technology offers Scouts the exciting opportunity to make friends in other countries without leaving home. JOTA is an annual event in which Boy & Girl Scouts & Guides all over the world speak to each other by means of Amateur (ham) Radio. Scouting experiences are exchanged & ideas are shared via radio waves. Since 1958 when the first Jamboree-on-the-Air was held, millions of Scouts have met each other through this event. Many contacts made during JOTA have resulted in pen pals & links between Scout troops that have lasted many years. With no restrictions on age or on the number of participants, & at little or no expense, JOTA allows Scouts to contact each other by ham radio. The radio stations are operated by licensed amateur radio operators. Many Scouts & leaders hold licenses & have their own stations, but the majority participate in JOTA through stations operated by local radio clubs & individual radio amateurs. Some operators use television or computer-linked communications.

This is where you come in! If you are interested in participating, simply find a local Boy or Girl Scout troop in your area. Some hams will invite the group over to their "shack" or set up in a public place like an EOC, park, campout, etc.. This is a very fun event & great way to promote our hobby to the next generation of future hams! There will be many stations operating, including the following: K2BSA stations assigned to various areas, such as K2BSA/0, K2BSA/1, etc.; HB95, the World Scout Bureau headquarters in Switzerland; & GB2GP at Gilwell Park, England, to name a few.

For more info on times/frequencies/ideas , go to the ARRL website & search "JOTA". There you'll find a wealth of information about JOTA & the ARRL's involvement with scouting.

# **MY ACCIDENT**

Hi Gang,

I'm writing this little note about my tower accident so that anyone else attempting to file a similar accident claim will know ahead of time how to properly fill out the accident forms for their insurance company.

I had decided to do a little work on my tower since I haven't done anything to it for more than ten years now and wouldn't you know it, I had an accident. Of course my insurance company requires me to write up an accident claim that basically describes in full detail just what I didn't do right. After writing it up and sending it in they wrote back wanting more explanation of just how clumsy I was.. So.. with my humility in check, I wrote them back describing in full detail just what I did that I now wish I hadn't.

"I am writing in response to your request for additional information for block number 3 of the accident reporting form. I put 'poor planning' as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter that I should explain more fully and I trust the

following detail will be sufficient.

I am an amateur radio operator and on the day of the accident, I was working alone on the top section of my new 80 foot tower. When I had completed my work, I discovered that I had, over the course of several trips up the tower, brought up about 300 pounds of tools and spare hardware. Rather than carry the now un-needed tools and material down by hand, I decided to lower the items down in a small barrel by using a pulley, which was fortunately attached to the gin pole at the top of the tower.

Securing the rope at ground level, I went to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and material into the barrel. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to ensure a slow descent of the 300 pounds of tools - You will note in block number 11 of the accident reporting form that I weigh only 155 pounds-. Due to my surprise of being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope.

Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid

rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot The Q-Fivez, Oct 2014, page 14



level, I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley.

Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold onto the rope in spite of my pain. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed approximately 20 pounds. I refer you again to my weight in block number 11. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot level, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles, and the lacerations of my legs and lower body.

The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell onto the pile of tools and, fortunately, only three vertebrae were cracked.

I am sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the tools, in pain, unable to stand and watching the empty barrel 80 feet above me, I again lost my presence of mind. I let go of the rope..."

# Dale's Tales for September sent 9/1/2014 8:55 PM

Greetings everyone,

Best wishes go out to all of the hams in Kentucky as they open the doors for the Greater Louis-ville Hamfest & Kentucky ARRL St Convention on September 6. (*Event past*, big 8<snip) You have doubtlessly heard of the national effort working toward passing HB 4969. This is known as the Amateur Radio Parity Act & is aimed at directing the PRB-1 style "reasonable accommodation" provisions for Amateur Radio antennas to include all types of land-use regulation, including deed restrictions & restrictive covenants, hence the term "parity". "CC&Rs" (covenants, conditions & restrictions) are the prohibitions & limitations placed on properties by builders or homeowner associations (HOAs) which prevent licensed Amateurs from erecting even modest antennas. As Congress returns to Session in early September, ARRL asks for your personal assistance in contacting your Congessperson to ask for support for HB 4969.

Full information can be found at <a href="http://www.arrl.org/hr-4969">http://www.arrl.org/hr-4969</a>. This page will also allow you to identify your congressman & his/her address. There is a link on this page that will allow you to download the draft of a letter to use as an example. I urge you to write & ask your Congressperson to support this request for reasonable accommodation for our antennas.

Now, this is really important to accomplish. The number of residents now living in HOAs has grown significantly in recent years. In many regions of the country, there are few opportunities for home ownership outside HOAs. Thus, the impact upon ham radio antennas has become significant. Some HOA "contracts" do not allow *any* sort of outdoor antenna. Somehow, it seems absurd when one considers they do not allow a ½ wave UHF mag-mount sitting on a rain gutter... The HOAs really do need to get "reasonable".

Our new Vice Director Tom Delaney W8WTD begins his monthly commentary with this introductory article:

Over the last few months, both Dale & Jim (K8JE) have written some kind words about me. Now you get to hear from me directly. I look forward to meeting many of you in the division, & representing your interests in ham radio. So I'll start with some reflections on the past few months. As you know, I was appointed in early July, so I had the chance to attend not just the Board meeting, but also the Centennial Convention in Hartford. It was a very busy time, & provided a more un-


