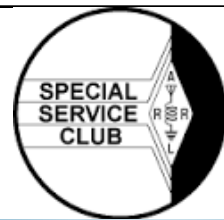

With considerable resources from the club, the Tech Committee contracted a tower climber and purchased a new antenna to replace our aging hardware. It was an overall success. There was another challenge we faced. Our 925 repeater needed a new home. Its current location in Colerain was being removed. We had no choice but to take it down, or lose the equipment. Our Tech Committee swooped in and rescued it and less than 4 months later, we have it back on air in its new location in Delhi.

Field Days

If there's one thing OHKYIN members love, it's making contacts. If there's two things, making contacts and food. Our Field Days met them both. This year we did very well in all three contests we participated in. Winter Field Day, NVIS day and of course, Field Day.

Our Field Day results were particularly great. We had a total score of 7,956 with over 2,200 contacts! This was high enough to score us 1st in our section, 2nd in our division of 41 and 87# of all field days, beating out 97%.



Of course, our Field Day runs on more than gasoline for our generators. We run on food, and Chef John delivered. Going well beyond the simple request for "beans and cookies," John came through with hearty breakfasts, our amazing Saturday picnic, and outstanding sides for our midnight Steak Out.

November 7th Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order by the President, Gary, KB8MYC, at 7:36 PM, with the Pledge of Allegiance. 45 persons gave self-introductions.

Brag Session – Robert, WA6EZV, told about working a newer digital mode, FT8, a working Reunion Island with 40 watts, and other contacts. A guest thanked the Club for teaching the Technician Class class. She said that she now understood electronics and radio concepts she never understood before and passed the test. [After the meeting I received a note from April Vanlanden of Centerville, IN, close to Richmond, IN expressing the same thoughts.] Tom, W8WTD, Vice-Director of the ARRL's Great Lakes Division, reported that the ARRL had sent trained amateur radio communicators to Puerto Rico to enhance communications there.

Minutes of October Meeting. After a brief time for corrections, it was moved and seconded to approve the Minutes as published. The motion carried.

Membership – We are at about 120 members. Dues for 2018 are due.

Treasurer's Report – 3 month's worth of reports were distributed. Time was given to review the reports.

Technical Committee – 3 repeaters are on the air. 146.625 is working well for where it is located. 146.670 is working well with its new antenna; it hears very well but transmits not quite as far. There was a work party at the 146.925 site and much was accomplished.; the repeater is operating at very low power. The 440 repeater is off the air; there are issues with both the Yaesu repeater and the Arcom controller.

Education – Classes are finished for the fall. 5 were tested, 1 who did not take our class. 2 upgraded to General Class. Pat Malley, KD8PAT, handed the Secretary a note from a person who lives in Centerville, IN and who took the Technician class; she was more than satisfied with the class.

Nets – There will be a review of the General Class License material on the Newcomers and Elmers Net this coming Sunday. Eric, N8YL will be net control on the Tech Talk net the second Wednesday of each month.

Fox Hunt – for the last fox hunt starting times were staggered for every three minutes. Brian won. Beginning immediately, on the odd numbered months of the year the fox hunt will be held of foot in different locations, beginning this month in Sharon Woods Park, meeting in front of the Nature Building.'

Old Business – George, N3VQW, spoke of Q-Fiver needs.

New Business – The Nominating Committee, Michael WD8SOH Chair, Eric N8YL and George N3QVW members, reported their Nominations.

Robert, AK3Q, showed his antenna analyzer built from a kit from India.

Tom, W8WTD, reported his efforts to build a remote control for QCEN to control a transceiver located near the Star 64 tower.

George, N3QVW, reported on projects for Raspberry PI and Arduinio computers.

Brian, K4BRI, reported on a spectrum monitor build around a minimal Arudino computer that will decode digital modes, a 2 meter transmitter and a SoftRock SDR receiver.

Bob, WA6EZV. Reported on an ARDF 80 meter receiver and a frequency monitor that he had built.

A raffle of mini computer equipment was won by KC8RPT, NA8R and KD8PAT and AD8SWE.

Split-the- pot received \$242 and Jerry, W1SCR won \$121.

The meeting adjourned at 8:58 PM.

Sometimes We Make Things Difficult!

The recent commissioning of the AO-91 satellite got me wanting to see if I could hear it, and possibly work it. As luck would have it, a pass was coming over within a few minutes of when I looked it up on amsat.org.

So, instead of having my Arrow antenna connected up to my dual-band handheld along with recorder and ear buds, I just had enough time to punch in the downlink frequency on my HT and get out into the back yard before the pass would be over.

I was using a slightly better antenna than a 2-meter rubber duckie, but not significantly better. As I recall it is a 22" telescoping antenna, with enough coil to come close to an electrical 1/2-wavelength antenna. Hardly a satellite hunter antenna!

Still, as I searched around the sky from my tiny lot, I caught the bird in flight sending out clear signals. I heard multiple contacts being made, almost like a DXpedition. These were signals coming from space!! That never ceases to thrill me!

Just hearing folks making contacts was exciting to me, and I caught myself thinking, "I would have missed this if I had not kept things simple." Sometimes we make things too complicated and we miss out. Yes, a Yagi antenna would have heard signals better, and a tripod would have allowed for steadier tracing of the signal, but I would have missed out on the pass because all of that setup takes more time than I had.

Instead of focusing on what I couldn't do (which I do too often!!), I grabbed a radio and an antenna and out to the back yard I went. Yes, my neighbors' houses are in the way, and the splotch of sky I can see is fairly small, but I heard signals from space all the same!

Will I find a good hill in the area and try to work other amateurs on that bird as soon as I can? You bet! But I am also glad to have had that tiny little serendipitous adventure pop up in the middle of the day. It certainly brought a smile to my face, and I bet it would do the same to most of us! A handheld and an antenna—it doesn't get any simpler than that!
