Techno-scribbles from An Old Man

There is a DXCC mode certificate called "Digital" that is awarded for contacts using the computer modes like FT8, packet, PSK31, AMTOR, PACTOR and many others. The grandfather of them all is RTTY.

Radio TeleTYpe uses a telegraphy code invented in the 1870s by Émile Baudot. Baudot code, as implemented, consists of a single bit called a start bit that is always a zero, known as a space, followed by 5 data bits and a stop bit, always a 1 called a mark. The start and data bits are of equal length but the stop bit is at least 1.5 times longer but can be of any longer length, today usually twice as long (if you stopped typing entirely you would be transmitting a continuous stop bit). The most common data speed is 45.45 bits per second, also known as 60 words per minute. Forty-five bits per second as compared to the millions of bits per second of most internet connections!

By the way "bits per second" is usually referred to as the baud rate, baud being a contraction of Monsieur Baudot's last name.

Originally, Baudot was encoded & decoded by an electro-mechanical device called a teleprinter. To transmit RTTY, amateurs use FSK, Frequency Shift Keying. A continuous carrier is shifted between 2 frequencies 850hz apart corresponding to whether the bit is a one or a zero. Originally, this was done by switching a capacitor or inductor in and out of a VFO circuit. As VFO stability improved over the years a 170hz shift became standard. Even later, as the carrier and opposite sideband suppression of SSB transmitters improved, AFSK, Audio Frequency Shift Keying, became common. AFSK uses a pair of switched audio tones fed into the mic circuit of a SSB transmitter which, if properly adjusted, transmits a signal indistinguishable from FSK.

For receive, audio from the receiver was fed to a device called a terminal unit or TU which converted the warbling audio to a serial stream of electrical current pulses that actuated an electromagnet in the teleprinter. Depending on the sequence in time of the 5 pulses, mechanical bits were pulled or pushed into positions that, when the stop bit arrived, would print the appropriate character on paper.

This YouTube video shows the inner workings of a Model 28 Teletype machine. Note the 5 vanes in the lower right that shift with the bits of the incoming characters.

By the way, "Teletype" was once a registered trademark, now expired, for the teleprinter machines manufactured by the Western Electric division of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. which was also known as "The Bell System" or "Ma Bell" or just "The Telephone Company." AT&T is still in business providing cellular phone and media services.



At one time, Baudot was the only code, other than Morse, that was authorized for use by amateur radio. Before the common use of personal computers, you had to actually own a teleprinter to operate RTTY. I owned several over the years. A Model 15, a Model 19 and, finally, a Model 28ASR all inhabited my shack. I used those machines to earn a DXCC certificate that was then labeled "RTTY"

I built my first personal computer, a Heathkit H8, in the late 1970s. Its limited computing power could replace only the teletype machine itself with the code I wrote. Audio from my receiver still had to be processed by the TU into a receive data stream. The tiny current of the transmit data out of the computer had to be processed by external circuits to drive the transmitter.

Today, a fast computer and my Flex radio, itself essentially a computer, do everything.

One last thing. The serial number on my RTTY DXCC certificate is #317. This morning (July 20) the Awards desk at ARRL issued Digital DXCC #8845.

Club E-Mail Lists

Do you get our club e-mails? Do you get them in a timely manner? The club maints two separate mailing lists on Groups.io. There is the mailing list for club members, called "OH-KY-IN Amateur Radio Society Members" with an address of ohkyin@groups.io. If you are a member of the club, you should belong to this list. This list is restricted to only current members. In the "Files" section of this group, you can find the membership directory as well as various other information which is a benefit of club membership.

Separate from that list, we also maintain a list called "OH-KY-IN Amateur Radio Society Public Information Group," which is for NON-members to which we wish to broadcast public information and announcements (think ARRL officials, leadership of other area clubs, etc.). If you are a current member of OH-KY-IN, there is little if any reason for you to belong to this mailing list. This group contains far fewer recipients than the member's list mentioned above. It also does **not** grant access to information which is a privilege of membership.

We've also heard comments from some members about not receiving club e-mails in a timely manner. For example, perhaps you receive a reminder of an event after the event has passed. This is almost always the result of settings the recipient has configured in Groups.io. If you think you are not receiving club e-mails timely, do the following: Log in to your Groups.io account. Select the OH-KY-IN group/subscription and then, on the left hand side, click the "Subscription" button. If you don't see a "Subscription" button on a lefthand menu, you may need to click the "menu" icon at the bottom of the screen (for smaller screens). On the "Edit Subscription" screen, make sure your "Email Delivery" option is set to "Individual Messages" and not one of the other options. Any of the other options will result in either missed or delayed e-mails.


