What the Heck is an Antipode?

Did you ever wonder where you would come out if you dug a hole straight through the center of the Earth from Cincinnati? That point is called the antipode and for Cincinnati, it is located in the Indian Ocean, about 1,200 miles west of the southwestern corner of Australia. Since the circumference of the Earth is about 24,900 miles, the distance to the antipode is half of that, or about 12,450 miles.

There are no significant islands in that area so on populated dry land, the farthest point that you can go from Cincinnati is south of Perth on the western coast of Australia, which is a maximum of about 11,250 miles from here. On this map, the orange marker is the antipode and the purple marker is Augusta, Western Australia, which is the closest city to the antipode. Perth is the most distant major city from us and is in the rarefied category of more than 11,000 miles away.



From a ham radio standpoint, that is VK6 territory. With the greatly-improved long-distance propagation that we are now experiencing with sunspot Cycle 25, contacts in that area are very feasible, even for those who have limited HF stations. I am one of those limited people and I have several contacts within 100 miles of the 11,250-mile theoretical maximum.

If you work HF, check to find your most distant contact (start by searching for VK6's, then expand the search if those are absent). The longest will probably be in Australia, if you have any QSO's there, since most Australian contacts are over 9,000 miles and there are few other populated areas that far away from here. Now that you know what an antipode is, you can impress your friends with your knowledge of geography and, hopefully, the impressive length of your longest contact as well. 73!

The Reading & Radio Ranch: Notes from the Library

Sometimes a touch of history is just the ticket that is needed for a bit of radio reading. Since the existence of radio waves was first proven by Heinrich Hertz in 1886 a lot of history has happened. One thing right after another in fact. For WWII buffs there is quite a bit of reading on radio that can be done, and one book in our club's library explores some of the virtuous uses of the technology.

World War II Radio Heroes: Letters of Compassion, by Lisa L. Spahr is such a book. Here is the blurb:

"More than 60 years had passed before I found them. Dozens of letters written to my family during WWII -from total strangers- to tell my great-grandmother that her son had been captured and was being held as a POW. How did they know this? Through short-wave radio, POWs were allowed to state their names and hometowns and sometimes relay a short message to their families. Scores of Americans, listening to the German propaganda from so far away, heard my grandfather's information and took it upon themselves to write to my great-grandmother. All of these dear people wanted to give my great-grandmother a measure of comfort to know her son was alive. This was only the beginning of my journey. This book is a dedication to them — the radio heroes of WWII."

The book is filled with amateur radio and short wave listening connections and the letters sent by concerned radio enthusiasts. It really is one of the many testaments to the good nature of so many of the people within this hobby. May it continue to be so!

This month I will not be able to be at the club meeting with the library, but plan to return for the May meeting. If you have an urgent need for a specific book or ham radio topic drop me a line and get in touch. I can bring you a book, you can pick one up, or we could meet at a clandestine location to make the book exchange.
