Meeting Location Change

Consistent with the discussion at the May club meeting, the OH-KY-IN club meetings will be moving! Starting with our **July** meeting, our in-person meetings will be held at the Village of Arlington Heights Town Hall, located at 601 Elliott Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio 45215 just a couple of minutes off of I-75 at the Galbraith Road exit. This new meeting location **is fully accessible**, with an elevator and no steps to navigate. There is a parking lot adjacent to the building which will

accomodate some of our members and there is ample on-street parking around the building. As always, please be respectful of the neighborhood and avoid blocking driveways, walking in lawns, etc.

We will continue to offer Zoom as well, with no changes expected in that regard.

Please note that, like our pre-COVID meeting location in St. Bernard, this is a polling location, which means that we will not have use of this facility on election days. We will announce plans for those dates later.

If there is no green light near the elevator button and the elevator doesn't open, please wait a little while for someone to arrive to unlock the elevator. ARRL Field Day Recap

This past weekend, OH-KY-IN ARS participated in ARRL Field Day 2024. While not our best showing, we had plenty of fun operating in this annual event!

Due to unforeseen circumstances, we did not operate from our usual Field Day spot, but thanks to John Phelps N8JTP, we worked at the Westside Masonic Center in Monfort Heights. This posed challenges as we needed to rethink antenna deployment and station placement in a new, smaller area.

Regardless of the challenges, the club deployed three primary HF stations, one each for CW, Digital and Phone, a Get On The Air, i.e. GOTA, station, and the satellite station. Considering the proximity of the three HF stations and the GOTA station, there was little to no RF interference between them, but there was a fair amount of aural interference, which meant breaking out the headphones! And Rocky McGrath KE8DZS's two children enjoyed working the GOTA station with Mike Niehaus KD8ZLB.

Satellite operations proved difficult as usual. Some of the problems from last year were resolved, but new problems cropped up, most of which were overcome. Three contacts were made using FM satellites. For some reason, the station could not be heard on the linear transponder satellites, which is our usual bread-and-butter. This will be the challenge to solve for next year.


We also were visited by Green Township Trustee Tony Rosiello and a visit from the Cheviot Fire Department, getting us some nice bonus points.

Thoughts on Approaching 50 Years of Ham Radio

My name is Henry and I am approaching 50 years of amateur radio operation. I started and operated quite a bit using Heathkit gear and a homemade doublet. When I had my license change from novice to advanced it opened up the 2-meter repeater and autopatch door and I was gone.

Life got in the way with college, grad school, work and children but I had some operation on 2-meters mostly.

Currently getting back in but I will come to that in a few more paragraphs.

I started with radio and operating one as a child. We had a boat that we used for shrimping and it was equipped with a marine band radio and whip antenna. This was very useful for talking to other boats, the dock and the Coast Guard when needed. In the late 60's we added a CB radio to the boat as lots of other fisherman were using these cheap radios to chat.

During emergencies, mostly hurricanes and other storm systems, I would walk half way down the block past the field (now a school) to get to the White's house, where Mr. White had a CB radio in his garage and a base antenna. I would work one of the evening or night shift monitoring channel 14 for other 'Outposts' as we called them to send a list of needed supplies. We would log that and forward to appropriate folks doing the boating delivery during said emergency. Signals were usually weak, but with no real noise perfectly readable. Talked in a range circle of 35 miles or so back than. The output station I worked in was KOR 5692.

When I got interested in having my own station I kept logs as I was accustomed to do.

It was during college that I finally tested through some friends for my Novice license. I became WD5DZD. Loved that I had a license but hated my call on CW! So I ordered an ARRL study guide (it went through Extra) and I read it and worked the problems. When I was ready I scheduled a Friday morning at the New Orleans FCC office and I showed up just before 8 am.

Passed the 6, 13, and 20 wpm code test and had my 20 wpm pass in my hand when I asked for the new Technician class test. I took it and passed, which let me now take the General class test. I also passed the Advanced test that day but only made a high 60 score on the Extra. Should have studied more on that section of the book, but I really only thought I would come out with General.

But with my new privileges I could rag chew on 20 meters during the day or talk on the 2-meter repeaters. I also had a phone encoder for using autopatches and that was great, like have a phone in your car. Using the marine operator to make a phone call was an \$8.50 charge to the receiving phone's bill.

I had a Heathkit 2-meter rig in the car and motorcycle with 4 repeater frequencies and simplex. Could not afford more crystals for it but when I rode my bike to the west coast and back from New Orleans, I was never out of coverage with those 4 repeater frequencies.

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When my house was finished with its build, I installed a homemade yagi out of 12 gauge wire on the roof, 30 degree angle up from flat and 45 feet long for 2 meters. With my 25 watt mobile unit I could talk to western Florida routinely.

In 1994 I helped in the NASA 25th Apollo Landing Radio event helping operate K5GY at the Stennis Space Center. Used their huge log periodic HF beam on a 50 foot tower and talked and worked all over the world that 24 hours. Still have a bag of stamps off all of the envelopes that I got for QSL cards.

I also worked the station during emergencies like hurricanes to man the radios and watch the weather and report it to stations.

I also used ATV on 70 cm with NASA to help transmit data from an aircraft to the ground during a survey fight.

By now, I am working hard in graduate school on my PhD, raising two girls, and living my life flying. Funny how the years slipped by.

Now it is 2018 and I suffer a Spinal Cord Injury from an accident. It is during this recovery that I return to my ham roots,

It was in the Spring of 2023 when I was finally able to help sort through a lot of my old stuff as part of house cleaning. I took my old radios, plugged them in and listened. A few signals but mostly not readable. It was a quick Google search later I understood the new digital FM used on repeaters. I was listening to 146.76 (why I never tuned in another is lost on me).

So I ordered a Yaesu FT70 and I could hear. Put up a 2 meter base antenna at 15 feet with RG58U, a SMA to PL259 adapter and I could now hit the repeater and talk. Ordered a FT5D from R&L and started chasing the ISS with an ARROW 2m/70 cm handheld antenna for 10 watts.

My wife and I would catch some nets on the America KC wide linked 146.76 repeater (Milford ARC) and we would sit out on the screened in back porch for Fishsticks and Trivia Net. Sometimes on a cold night we would be wrapped in blanket to take part in the net, always fun.

Got a FTM300D again from R&L (where I bought all my antennas and radios through except that FT70) and started it beaconing APRS as N5AWB-9.

Also bought a Radiodiddy QB 25 (does (144, 220, 350, 420) at 25 watts. It feeds a Triband base antenna (Comet CX-333) with 50 feet of LNR400 at 20 feet. I can work Lexington, Dayton, and eastern Indiana Repeaters on those bands.

My FT5D also does portable beaconing as N5AWB.

On Monday nights I play with the SSTV gang on the 146.67 repeater on Monday night at 9 pm EST. Lots of fun and I can use either radio for that purpose.

I finally entered my Haiku from last year as I missed the deadline, but made it this year. We will see. I spend some time during the day or night listening to my 4 Baofengs that are used as scanners. One has emergency frequencies, another the railroad frequencies, another GMRS in and out frequencies, and one devoted to 220.

I am in the process of assembling some ATV/DATV gear for 440 and 1.2 GHz. Need to get a tower up and that will mean buying the new ICOM IC905 for ATV work. I have 1.2, 2.4, yagis, and grid parabolics for 2.4 - 11 GHz. Today I received the box of DATV gear from KH6HTV in Colorado so I can assemble the station and

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see what I will need in feed lines for the coming tower.

So you can see that I have jumped in literally with both feet, as it were.

Here is what I see as different today as opposed to yesteryear. GMRS is the new CB band. My older CB radio still works and there are a few folks around but there are a lot of huge transmitters elsewhere rolling in. I also what I would call as CD talk on the ham bands. Folks making words fit like 'destinating' or 'Destinate' for arriving. I hear that on the local repeaters. However, American KC Wide also has folks talking with, 'The computer tells me there are 136 nodes connected to this room, so someone must be out there listening somewhere, push the button on your mike and talk, else you would have bought a scanner. Trying to get folks to call back. Some things never change.

On the plus side I get to have some interesting folks around the world without ever leaving my back porch. I have chatted with a gentleman in Germany, France, Australia, Japan, England, and Iceland. Guy in Iceland, named Guy, told me that the volcano in his backyard had a crack in it. Something I do not hear everyday.

I belong now to 4 local clubs, Milford, VOA, OHKYIN and NKARC. Plan on getting out this Saturday at Field Day to go meet folks I have been chatting with.

I bit the bullet after hearing folks talking about QSL cards the other day so I contacted QSLWORKS and 3 days later had 1000 new QSL cards to send out. Bet they would be surprised at how fast I got my cards, don't have the heart to tell them how it worked out. They are having too much fun complaining about getting theirs, do not want to rob them of their pleasure.

Some of what I have been doing with ham radio shows up on my YouTube channel, 'ROSCOE1024', take a look and checkout the Ham Radio playlist.



Saved my old Advanced license away as I ordered a new Station Plaque to hang in the new shack along with a ham ID tag. Ordered one for my XYL as well.

So folks, there is a brief story of my ham journey nearing 50 years. I thank you for your time.
