AMATEUR RADIO INTERFERENCE AND PACEMAKERS

I am one of 12 million Americans that suffer from Atrial Fibrillation (AF). Atrial fib is an irregular heart rhythm, during which the atria beat chaotically out of sync with the ventricles. I've had it for 32 years and with proper treatment you can live a normal life, yet AF increases the risk of stroke by about 5 times. In my recent visit to my cardiologist he raised the possibility that in the future I may need a Pacemaker (PM). I was not happy, except for the word future. When that happens, having a new PM implanted in my chest, coming back from the hospital should I be worry when I turn on my Yaesu rig for a CW or FT8 QSO?

Let's see how a PM works. The response of muscle to electricity is known since Galvani in 1768 using a voltaic pile observed frog muscle contraction in response to an applied voltage. Pacemakers use this method to induce heartbeats in our bodies. The pacemaker's transmit mode is called "pacing," and the receive mode is called "sensing." In the pacing mode, the PM sends a signal to the heart. In the "sensing" mode, the PM receives a signal from the heart.

The pacing mode results in the contraction of the heart muscle. During the sensing (listening) mode, the PM receives a signal indicating whether a normal heartbeat has occurred (that means whether our heart has provided a properly timed "rhythmic" beat).

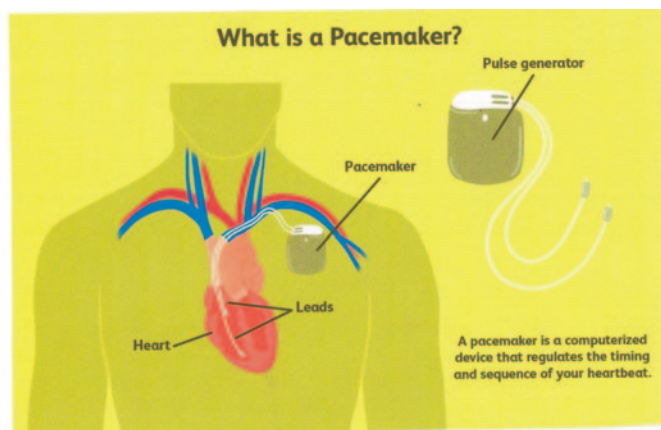
After the PM hears a normal beat and after a short "blanking" period, the PM is switched again to "listen." If no heartbeat is detected at the end of the set interval, the PM is switched to transmit mode, which sends a 0.5 MS, 5 V pulse to the heart which now contracts with a "new" heart beat. After this beat, the PM switches back to "sensing," the receive mode, which is the most vulnerable to RF interference.

During implantation surgery, the electrical connection is made between the PM and the heart. The PM leads are inserted through a small vein in the upper chest. It is done during one day of hospitalization.

Pacemakers requires lithium-iodide batteries with life spans between 4 and 7 years. Problems like failure of the "insulation" of the lead may occur which creates a short circuit that may drain the battery. In some patients, scar tissue develops at the lead tip increasing the circuit's resistance and the stimulation threshold. Pacemakers are susceptible to RF interference. As hams, we know that subjecting a wire to an electromagnetic field causes a current to flow in the wire. This is how our antennas works... The PM lead is such a wire, and it can act as an antenna, receiving unwanted RF signals that can interfere with normal operation. As Fred Weber AA2KI describes in the QST article,¹ "As long as the interfering signal exists and continues to blank the pacemaker's receiver, no pacing pulses will be sent to the heart muscle. Blackout and death can occur." However fortunately for us hams, pacemaker manufacturers apply design methods that, for the most part, shield the PM circuitry from even high EM field radiation.

A great deal of knowledge comes from AA2KI, thoracic surgeon, attorney at law Member New Jersey Bar, author of the QST August 1994 article "Pacemakers, Interference and Amateur Radio."

In his article, Fred described the following case: "Ten days after I implanted a PM in Charles Gilbert, W3YJM, a continuous 24 hour recording of his heart's activity was made as he went about his normal daily activities.



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Three on air operating sessions in his radio shack were recorded. Charles fed 100 W to several antennas on several bands. The first session involved contacts on 20 meters using a half-wave dipole. Later, operation was switched to 40 meters, also using a dipole. Finally, Charles keyed up on 80 meters using an inverted V antenna. No discernible effect on the PM was noted.” According to Fred this experiment illustrate that hams with a PM can safely use their radio stations.

When I reviewed the chapter on Safety by the ARRL Handbook for Radio Communication 2014, Ninety First Edition,² a series of experiments to test the PM were conducted. In one series, the pacemaker was connected to a heart simulator, then the system was placed on the top of the cabinet of a 1 kW linear amplifier using SSB and CW operation. In another series, the system was placed in close proximity to several 1 to 5 W 2 meter band handheld transmitters. The PM and heart simulator were placed on the ground 9 meters below a three element Yagi HF antenna. No interference with the PM was observed in these experiments.

With cellular phones there was no significant interference when the phone was placed in the normal position over the ear. Clinically significant interference occurred in 1.7% of the cases and only when the phone was placed over the pacemaker. Interference was more common in dual chamber PM (25.3%) than in single chamber (6.8%) and in digital phones (24%) compared to analog phones (3%). Patients with PM should use analog telephones, carrying the phone on different side of the body in relation to the PM and the phone should be held at least 15 cm away from the PM and on the opposite ear. This article will not cover airport gates, medical MRI and many other sources of EMI and potential RF interference. Certainly the MRI with their powerful magnets are very dangerous. An MRI scanner produces EM fields that are many times greater than those found in even high-power ham stations. There are many other uncommon sources of electromagnetic interference (EMI). For example, antitheft devices are currently used almost everywhere. They may cause EMI with PM. Reversion to asynchronous “pacing” and rapid ventricular pacing owing to tracking high frequency signals sensed in the atrium are the two most common interactions. They are transient and return to normal function once the patient is out of the field.

As long as hams follow accepted safety practices, it is safe to operate their radio stations. We should reinforce the concept of proper “grounding” of their rigs and antenna to minimize EM effects.

One last precaution involves the location of the antenna. Most hams use external antennas that limit the exposure to RF energy. Everyone with PM should do that. The increasing use of indoor loops and attic wires, however, brings RF close to our bodies. Hams with pacemakers should avoid these type of antennas. As I read the chapter on Safety from the ARRL Handbook, I feel relieved that I should be able to continue the practice of this beautiful “Art of Communication.”

Hams Ride With Police; Interstate Kept Safe

Radio Hams of Southeastern Indiana's Laughery Valley Amateur Radio Club and the Greater Queen City's OH-KY-IN VHF Society helped Indiana State Police keep a 60-mile stretch of Interstate 74 safe for motorists the nights of Oct. 30 and 31. With Jack Demaree, WB9OTX, of Versailles riding with a state trooper on his patrol of the expressway, 20 additional Hams in their amateur radio-equipped autos maintained watch on I-74 overpasses.

Thanks to the two-night vigil, there was not a single incident of rocks or other objects being thrown from these overpasses onto vehicles on the roadway, below.

Solid communications coverage between the police cruiser and each of the other radio Hams throughout the operations area was over the Ham two meter (146 MHz) band. The 146.805 MHz/147.205 MHz repeater in Osgood was used.

Ed Bills, WB9TFD, of Sunman headed the communications effort.

"Amateur radio is the best system of them all," the State Police told the Hams at the conclusion of the operation. More Ham-State Police co-operative activities were said to be in the offing.

OH-KY-IN VHF Society claims the world record for the greatest distance covered by an autopatch telephone call. Jim Sorrell, AC8H, of Mason, Ohio, made the call from Japan to Cincinnati's 146.07 MHz/146.67 MHz repeater Wednesday, January 10.

On business in Nagoya, Japan, Sorrell made the call at 9:15 p.m. EST. Repeater trustee Jack Foster, K8DYD, answered it. For 10 minutes, Jim spoke through his telephone in Japan and the amateur radio repeater on WLW tower to Sorrell's new antenna tower to Ham radio throughout the Tri-State.

This telephone-to-ham radio call covered 12,000 miles and passed through repeaters in two commercial communications satellites before being relayed by telephone into the OH-KY-IN repeater and onto the amateur radio waves.

CONGRATULATIONS: To Lois Yarbrough, WD8JAJ, for receiving an "excellent" award for the Q-Fiver monthly newsletter she edits. The award was made by the national Amateur Radio News Service in its annual publications award competition.

New Bylaws Adopted

As of our April, 2025 club meeting, we achieved quorum and by unanimous vote of those present adopted an updated set of bylaws for the club. These bylaws modernize club operation and bring us more in line with how current non-profit organizations function. Thank you to all the members that made a special effort to attend so we could finally make this happen.

Bylaws as Adopted on April 1, 2025

OH-KY-IN AMATEUR RADIO SOCIETY, INC. (the "Society")

CODE OF REGULATIONS (also referred to as BYLAWS)

Adopted April 1, 2025

ARTICLE I. MEMBERSHIP

A. Any person interested in Amateur Radio and who is in sympathy with the purposes of this Society may become a member upon completing an application for membership and payment of any applicable dues; however, an application for membership may be rejected, or the membership of any individual may be terminated, by the Board of Directors if in the opinion of the Board the prospective or continued membership of that individual is not in the best interests of the Society due to prior or continuing violation of F.C.C. rules, disruptive behavior, or other reasonable cause as determined by the Board, whose decisions shall be final.

B. The dues (which may vary depending on categories set by the Board) shall be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time, and shall be payable to the Treasurer during the month of January or at such other time as the Board of Directors may approve. Dues unpaid three months after the due date shall result in automatic termination of membership.

C. Any members qualifying for free membership under categories that may be established by the Board, shall have no voting rights.

ARTICLE II. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

A. Except where authority is otherwise designated under the law, the Articles of Incorporation or these Bylaws, authority over the affairs of this Society shall be exercised by or under the direction of the Board of Directors, which shall consist of three elected Directors serving staggered three-year terms, with one Director being elected each year; together with the four elected officers specified below who serve ex-officio with vote. However, all members of the Board of Directors must be current members of the Society. The annual election of one Director shall be conducted along with the election of officers as provided below.

B. If any Director dies, resigns, is removed, or becomes unable to serve, the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the remaining Directors, even if the number remaining is less than otherwise required for a quorum.

C. Any Director may be removed from office by majority vote of those members present at a regular or special meeting of the members, provided that notice of the proposed action has been given to the members as provided in Article V.D.

D. The Board shall schedule regular meetings to occur at least bi-monthly. The President, or in the absence of the President the Vice-President, may cancel a meeting if there is no business to conduct. Special meetings may be called by the President or by any three Directors with notice to the Board as provided in Article II.E. Four Directors shall form a quorum for any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors, and the majority vote of Directors present shall be the action of the Board unless otherwise required by law or these Bylaws. Directors may not vote by proxy but may attend a meeting by telephone conference call, video call or other electronic means which allow all participating Directors to hear each other. The Board may also act by unanimous

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written consent, and email or other electronic communications may be accepted for that purpose.

E. Notice of regular or special Board meetings (other than regularly-scheduled meetings as established at the beginning of each year) shall be sent to each Director not less than five days prior to such meeting either (1) by first class mail to his or her residence or place of business as listed in the Society's records or (2) by electronic mail to his or her e-mail address, if one has been furnished for that purpose to the Society. Such notice shall set forth the time and place of such meeting and shall be valid if sent as stated in the preceding sentence, whether or not actually received. Business to be transacted at any regular meeting of the Board shall not be limited to those matters set forth in the notice of meeting. Notice of any meeting of the Board may be waived by the execution of a written waiver of such notice, either before or after the holding of such meeting by any Director. The attendance of any Director at any meeting without protest at the commencement of the meeting shall be deemed to be a waiver of notice of the meeting.

F. Board meetings are open to members, so the date and location of Board meetings (other than confidential meetings as provided below) must be distributed to the membership in advance of each meeting. However, the Board may conduct a confidential special meeting or executive session at a regular meeting to discuss sensitive topics such as actual or potential litigation, contract negotiations, and other legal or personnel matters.

G. Directors (including current officers serving ex-officio) shall not receive any compensation for their service but shall be entitled to reimbursement of authorized expenditures made on behalf of the Society. The Society may purchase directors and officers liability insurance or other reasonable and customary coverages for the benefit of the Directors.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

A. The elective officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. These officers shall be elected annually at the December meeting by majority vote of the members present and voting. All of the elected officers must be Amateur Radio operators licensed by the Federal Communications Commission.

B. Elected officers of the Society shall serve one year terms (calendar year) and until their successors are elected and take office.

C. The President shall appoint a three-member Nominating Committee and the Nominating Committee shall submit, at the November meeting, names of proposed candidates for each of the four officers and one elected Director. Additional nominations may be made by members from the floor at this meeting.

D. Election of officers from the candidates identified at the November meeting (as the list of candidates may be supplemented by majority vote at the December meeting) shall take place at the December meeting and shall be by majority vote of the members present.

E. The Board may appoint one or more Assistant Vice-Presidents, Assistant Secretaries or Assistant Treasurers or such other officers, having such duties and responsibilities as the Board shall deem advisable. Such non-elected officers need not be Directors and shall serve at the pleasure of the Board.

F. The President may establish or discontinue committees from time to time in his or her discretion, except as specified in this subsection. A financial review committee of three members shall be appointed by the President at the January meeting each year. The records of deposits and expenditures from the Society's bank accounts shall be reviewed, and a report submitted at the March general membership meeting. A three-person property review committee shall be appointed by the President in January of even-numbered years to review the physical property owned by the Society and present a report no later than the November general membership meeting of the same year. It is recognized that the members of these committees are not professional auditors and they shall not be personally liable for any failure to detect any irregularity that may have occurred.

G. The President shall appoint chairpersons for all committees. Terms for the chairpersons of all committees

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shall be one year and shall run concurrently with the elected officers, but the President may remove and replace any such chairperson at any time.

ARTICLE IV. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

A. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society, shall be a member ex-officio of all committees, and shall have all other powers and perform all other duties usually pertaining to the office. The President shall make or cause to be made reports concerning the activities of the Society to the members and to any other relevant recipients such as the American Radio Relay League.

B. The Vice President shall preside in the absence of the President and shall act as aide to the President.

C. The Secretary shall keep an accurate record of all meetings of the Society, and keep a roster of members. The Secretary shall conduct the official correspondence of the Society and be responsible for acquiring information, and maintaining records.

D. The Treasurer shall be custodian of all the funds of the Society, and shall be responsible for the proper deposit of such funds in an FDIC-insured bank or other investment authorized by the Board. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate itemized account of all receipts and expenditures and pay bills as authorized by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall render a report at each meeting of the Society. The Treasurer shall be responsible for filing all necessary reports to the State of Ohio and the United States Internal Revenue Service. Such reports shall be filed at such time as stipulated by the various agencies of the above so as not to incur any penalties for late filing.

E. Officers shall not receive any compensation for their service but shall be entitled to reimbursement of authorized expenditures made on behalf of the Society. The Society may purchase directors and officers liability insurance or other reasonable and customary coverages for the benefit of the officers.

ARTICLE V. MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

A. Regular monthly or bi-monthly meetings of the membership shall be held from January through December. The date of regular meetings for the following calendar year shall be selected by the Board of Directors at its November meeting and published in the Society's official publication, but such scheduled meeting dates may be changed subsequently by the Board upon giving further notice to the members as provided in Article V.D. The meetings of this Society shall be open to interested persons, but the privilege of making motions, debating or voting shall be limited to dues-paid members of the Society, and the presiding officer may exclude any person who is disruptive or whose presence is otherwise determined to be not in the best interests of the Society. Business to be transacted at any regular meeting of the membership shall not be limited to those matters set forth in the notice of meeting, but shall not include amendment of these Bylaws or removal of any Director unless the proposed actions were set forth in the notice. Members may vote by proxy if a proper written proxy is provided to the Secretary at the meeting.

B. A special membership meeting may be called by the President, or by the Vice President in the President's absence, at a reasonable time and place, with notice as provided in Article V.D. The notice must state the business to be conducted at the special meeting, and only that business may be conducted at that special meeting.

C. 20% of the Society's membership may call a special meeting of the membership at a reasonable time and place. The petition calling such a meeting shall be presented to the President, or to the Vice-President in the President's absence. The petition must state the business to be conducted at the special meeting, and only that business may be conducted at that special meeting. Upon receipt of any such proper petition, notice of the special meeting must be given by the Society to the membership as provided in Article V.D.

D. Notice of regular meetings of members is deemed given when published in the Society's official publication

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at least ten days prior to such meeting (and may be published up to a year in advance). Notice of a special meeting of members shall be deemed given if it is announced at a regular meeting of the members at least ten days prior to such special meeting, is published in the Society's official publication, or is sent by electronic mail to all members who have furnished such an address to the Society (through subscription to the Society's public email reflector or otherwise), in each case at least ten days prior to such special meeting. Such notice of a special meeting shall set forth the time and place of such meeting and shall be valid if given as stated in the preceding sentence, whether or not actually received. The attendance of any member at any meeting without protest at the commencement of the meeting shall be deemed to be a waiver of notice of the meeting.

E. The rules in ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, REVISED, shall govern the Society's meetings in all cases to which they are applicable unless inconsistent with other provisions of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

A. The official publication of the Society will be called the Q-FIVER, unless a different name is approved by the Board of Directors. It shall be published monthly (with any exceptions approved by the Board of Directors) and distributed to all members in good standing who have furnished an electronic mail address for that purpose. The Editor shall be appointed by the President. It is the responsibility of the Editor to maintain the editorial policy of the publication consistent with the policies and practices of the Society.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENTS

A. These Bylaws may be amended at any regular or special meeting by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting.

B. No Bylaw amendment shall be put to a vote at a membership meeting unless notice of the meeting has been given as provided in Article V.D together with the text of the proposed changes in these Bylaws.
