My Bouvet Adventure

Bouvet Island is considered one of the most remote in the world, being located in the Antarctic region 1,600 miles from any inhabited area (the southern end of South Africa) and largely covered with glaciers. It has traditionally been considered second only to North Korea in ham radio difficulty. In 2023, DXers were thrilled that the most expensive DXpedition in history was launched. The crew returned home safely but the results from an amateur radio standpoint were abysmal. Most of the team never made it onto the island and they logged only about 7,000 contacts, a tiny fraction of what a typical expedition accomplishes. When they were unable to unload all of their gear and personnel onto the island, the partial operation was haphazard — for example, computers running FT8 had no GPS time sync hardware and as a result, few digital contacts were made.

This year, a similar team geared up for an even more expensive attempt, using a helicopter to overcome the difficulties in getting people and gear onto the island.

I was very doubtful that I would get Bouvet. I have a good radio but I live in an urban high-noise area and due to HOA restrictions, I have only random wire antennas for HF. When the expedition started, my apprehension seemed to be justified as I followed many spots but rarely received workable signals — and in those cases, there were overwhelming pileups — and deliberate QRM. For unknown reasons, the expedition leadership chose to operate digital on .090 frequencies on most bands. I have no proof, but it seems to me that the RTTY Mafia took that as a taunt and operated an unprecedented jamming operation.

I am also dismayed that the most expensive expedition in history didn't have a livestream or any other publicized current information on its operations (as a result, I saw successful callers going back for multiple backup contacts, QRMing those who were still trying for the first one). The promised Facebook "current updates" were a joke. So I followed what they were doing on DXlite and looked at PSKreporter to see if they were actually making it into the Eastern U.S.

A friend had success getting other DX at 4 a.m. and that got me thinking about possible advantages of trying for Bouvet in the middle of the night. Local noise should be lower, pileups should be slimmer, and maybe even the jammers would be catching up on their rest. It wasn't prime time for propagation but VOACAP predicted decent conditions, at least on the middle bands 17 through 40 meters.



So on my birthday, March 7th, I didn't go to bed at the usual time and was monitoring from around midnight. For a long time, it seemed that this was going to be more wasted effort but then at 2 a.m., DXlite showed that 3Y0K was starting FT8 on 18095. I went there and was thrilled to see 3 streams decoding consistently. I beat the crowd and got the all-time new one (ATNO) in 5 minutes! Happy Birthday to me! I alerted Robert K4PKM and 17 meters had faded by the time he got on, but the middle of the night strategy worked for him too, as he soon got the ATNO on another band.

After that, I went back to usual spot-checking for several days during "normal hours" and got nowhere, so I decided to try the late-night strategy again one more time before QRT. On March 12, around 2:20 a.m., I found Bouvet on the atypical frequency of 7070

FT8 and got the contact in about 10 minutes. There was no jamming seen on 7070 but I never saw them on that frequency again as they seemed to have gone back to 7090.

So my expectations of failure were disproven and I got 2 bands. Another mode would have been nice but I checked many CW spots and could never get a workable signal with my limited station. That's DXCC 285 (out of 340) for me, which is certainly unimpressive by serious DXing standards but decent, I think, given my setup and having operated only 8 years.

Dan Beard Council Radio Scouting Committee

Troop 674 Radio Demo Day - March 3, 2026

On the evening of March 3, 2026, the Dan Beard Council Radio Scouting Committee (RSC) rolled into Montgomery's Troop 674 with antennas, radios, and a lot of enthusiasm. About 30 Scouts and 6 adult leaders gathered at the Church of the Savior in Cincinnati for what started as a regular troop meeting and turned into a STEM night on the radio. Running under the Scouts on the Air and call sign K2BSA/8, the RSC team set up three radio stations and spent the next hour getting every Scout on the air - talking to people across the region, across the city, and right across the gym.

The format was simple and it worked well. Scouts rotated through three stations every fifteen minutes, each one showing off a different side of amateur radio. The gear alone turned heads - military-style hard cases popped open to reveal HF rigs running off portable battery packs, handheld VHF radios crackled with local traffic, and FRS walkie-talkies got passed around for a tactical challenge game that had the whole campus buzzing.

One of the real highlights of the night was how many people from the ham radio community "showed up" to support the event. The Queen City Emergency Net (QCEN) jumped in at the last-minute and allowed the scouts to use their club repeater and they had operators checking in all evening. Robert Overstreet and the Milford Amateur Radio Club (MARC) were supporters as well. On the HF station, Scouts made real contacts with W8TDA (Kitty Hevener), KE8TDE (Ben), W8NFM (Bob), KB9ORF (Roy), K9CVO (Ken), KB7PKD (Mark), N8JMV (Rob), Scott Harshman, Ken Castille, Jay Wysong, John Christopher, and Adam Stone - all volunteers who parked on frequency just to talk to a Scout. Bill Stearns (NE4RD) from K2BSA and Kirk Musselman (K9MSG) from Scouts on the Air were also key in making the whole thing happen. And in a pretty special moment, Michael (N2HTE) shared that he was an alumni of Troop 674 - although his Troop 674 was in West Seneca NY.

Troop 674 was a great host and a great group to work with. The energy from the Scouts and their leaders made the whole night click. For the RSC, this is exactly what the committee was built to do - get radios in the hands of young people and show them that amateur radio is alive, relevant, and a lot of fun. Next up, the team is already looking at tightening up the format - smaller patrol groups, a real-time contact map, and a more polished frequency plan.

The Three Stations

Station 1: HF - Talking Across the Region (40 Meters SSB)

The HF station was the centerpiece of the night. Jocelyn (KD8VRX) ran it under K2BSA/8 on 40 meters SSB, and Scouts took turns at the mic making real contacts with operators across the region - some hundreds of miles away. Scouts spoke with operators as far away as Texas and Georgia, and plenty of hams here in Ohio. They spoke to former scout masters, a Taekwondo instructor and even an Eagle Scout.

Station 2: VHF - Connecting Across Cincinnati (2 Meters FM)

Kurt (AD8ML) ran the VHF station connected to the local QCEN 2-meter repeater (located at the Cincinnati Red Cross building), where Scouts spoke with hams across Cincinnati who had tuned in to say hello. If HF is the big show, VHF is where you realize just how much radio activity is already happening all around you. Scouts got a quick lesson on how repeaters work and why that matters.

Station 3: FRS/GMRS - Tactical Radio Challenge Game

Michael (N2HTE), Lance (KF8EEM), and Adam (KF8EKW) ran the FRS/GMRS station, and this one was loud in the best way. Each mini patrol got a tactical call sign, radios went in hands, and the Radio Roulette challenge kicked off - net control issuing movement orders, teams responding and relaying across the church. It was competitive, it was chaotic in stretches, and the Scouts loved it. It's also a natural bridge to Option E of the newly updated 2026 Radio Merit Badge requirements, which now formally recognizes FRS/GMRS as a valid path into radio communications for Scouts.

Do you have a photo you think would look good on the cover? Send it! Cover photos must comply with a few requirements. Most importantly, like all content included in this publication, we must be able to clearly determine that we are allowed to reprint it. This can be proven in one of two ways. Method one is if it is original artwork you personally created and you can attest to it being your property, created by you. Method two is for you to provide clear evidence of where you obtained the artwork along with a reference showing that we are free to reproduce it (e.g. a link to the license terms for the artwork, written permission from the creator, etc.). Cover photos/art must also be composed in such a way that the masthead at the top of the cover page will not cover the main subject of the photo/art and space exists for the "In this issue" box. Images that relate in some way to radio are preferred but other pieces will be considered as well.

Consider a Donation to OH-KY-IN

Did you know that OH-KY-IN ARS has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization? That means anyone who itemizes on their Federal return can take a charitable deduction for a contribution to OH-KY-IN, as long as it qualifies under the general rules applicable to all other charitable contributions (for example, the contribution must be in cash, or other property which the organization has agreed to accept; the value of volunteered services is not deductible). Membership dues, such as the cost of a life membership, may even be deductible; consult your own tax advisor for details if considering that. Posthumous donations by Will or by naming the organization as beneficiary of a financial account are also welcome.

Special Note for Seniors: Anyone who is over 70½ can make a donation to OH-KY-IN from their IRA and enjoy a tax benefit even if they don't itemize deductions, using what is called a QCD. Simply direct your IRA custodian to make the donation directly to OH-KY-IN (not payable to you) and the distribution will not result in any taxable income to you, even without itemizing deductions on your return. Contact your IRA custodian for the proper form to use.
